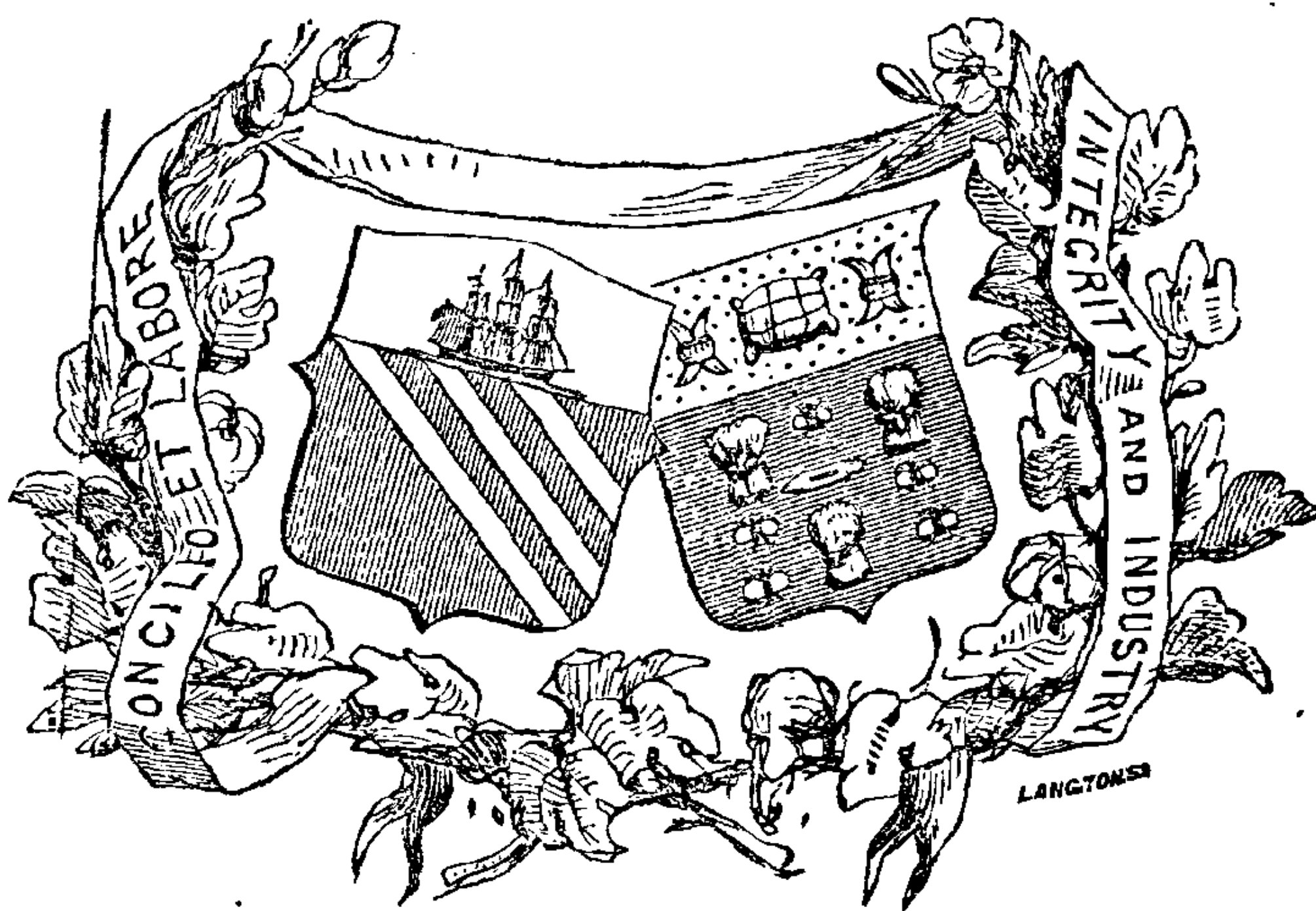

The arrangement of the Work embraces a compiled historical sketch of Manchester, exhibiting its commercial greatness, the rise and progress of the cotton and other manufactures, in their varied arrangements, and the inventions and improvements in machinery, which, as involving the highest interest, has been given in preference to a formal history—together with an historical sketch and statistical and commercial description of each town and parish, their locality, extent and population, charitable, educational, and other public institutions, churches and chapels with their ministers, public buildings, corporate bodies, magistrates, and public officers, courts of law, and the names of their officials, with a variety of other useful and important matter, collected by personal application. The Railway information, too, consisting of British, Colonial, and Foreign, and the statistics connected therewith, will, it is presumed, be found to possess no common interest, and haply may be perused with some measure of curiosity.

To the historical and descriptive sketch of each town and parish succeeds a DIRECTORY of the inhabitants, presenting in a classification for easy reference the names, designations, and addresses of the nobility, gentry, clergy, professional gentlemen, merchants, manufacturers, tradesmen, farmers, and other principal residents, alphabetically arranged in copious miscellanies, or classified under the heads of their respective trades and professions, with the post-office and railway regulations, and every medium of public conveyance for passengers and merchandise—and the Work is embellished with a Map of Lancashire, on which the numerous railways and canals that intersect the county will be found correctly delineated.

ALTRINCHAM.

ALTRINCHAM is a pleasant little market town in Cheshire, in the Hundred of Bucklow, about eight miles S.S.W. from Manchester, with which it has ready connection by the Altrincham and South Junction Railway, the Bridgewater Canal, and an excellent level road forming one of the best and most delightful drives in the kingdom. The town is exceedingly clean and rural in its appearance; and its environs are studded with first-class mansions and villas, in ornamental gardens. The houses throughout the town are generally of a substantial and imposing character, while its situation is dry and remarkably salubrious.

The town formerly possessed a quaint old-fashioned market cross, consisting of a room used as a moot hall, and surmounted by a tower and vane. It stood in the centre of the market place, but has recently been removed, and a handsome and commodious market hall has been erected on another site, near to the Unicorn Inn. There are several excellent hotels, amongst which may be mentioned the Unicorn, the Stamford Arms, &c., and in connection with which are beautiful bowling greens. The railway station, an elegant structure, within two minutes' walk of the market place, is built in keeping with the rural appearance of the town. Agriculture and horticulture furnish the occupation for the labouring classes, and Manchester is largely supplied with fruit and vegetables from this locality.

Altrincham is a chapelry under Bowden. The church is built of brick, singularly plain and neat, but in accordance with the air of quiet respectability and comfort which pervades the town. The present incumbent is the Rev. F. Orton, and the living is in the gift of the Vicar of Bowden. There are several neat chapels and schools here belonging to dissenters, &c.; and the Roman Catholics have a place of worship in New street. A court leet is held here by the Earl of Stamford and Warrington, who is lord of the manor—the chief officer of which is styled the “mayor,” but he does not exercise any magisterial functions, though he has certain privileges or perquisites. This office appears to have originated by charter granted about the year 1200 (during the reign of Edward I.), by Hamon de Massey, baron of Dunham Massey. By this charter he constituted Altrincham a free borough, and granted to the burgesses a “*guild mercatory*” (or society of free traffic), together with freedom of tolls throughout the barony; and also that his “burgesses might make to themselves *provosts or mayors and bailiffs*, by the common advice of myself—and my bailiffs and theirs, and that no plea in the said burgh be determined except before me or my bailiffs.” The remainder of the charter fixes the terms on which burgesses are to be held by the lord; reserves to him and his heirs “the privileges of our oven in the said burgh;” and undertakes to maintain the rights thus granted to the burgesses against all people for ever. By a charter in the eighteenth year of his reign, Edward I. granted to Hamon de Massey a market on Tuesday, a fair of three days' duration on

the eve, the day, and the morrow of the Feast of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin. It would appear that at some remote period the then lord of the barony offered to grant to the mayor of Altrincham a yearly payment of £5, or land of the same yearly value. The mayor choose the land, which now produces a yearly rental of upwards of £80, and will steadily progress. A similar offer was made about the same time to the mayor of Ashton-under-Lyne, whose manor was under the same barony; he choose to have the payment in money, and consequently all he receives is £5 yearly. "The Mayor's Land," as it is called in Altrincham, consists of 13a. 1r. 26p. statute measure, the rental of which the mayor has the sole right to receive and disburse at his discretion. There have been, however, mayors sufficiently noble-minded to consider the "custom more honoured in the breach than by the observance," and have expended the money in local improvements and other useful purposes.

Sir Peter Leycester, in his "Historical Antiquities," says of Altrincham—"There are so many very small cottages erected here by permission of the lords of Dunham Massey, that it is now become a nest of beggars." Could Sir Peter, however, revisit Altrincham now, he would find in the place of his "nest of beggars" a scene approximating to an architectural Elysium has been substituted. The Earls of Stamford and Warrington have been for many generations, and continue to this day lords of the manor.

In 1810 the population of Altrincham was 1,692, and in 1851 it amounted to 4,488.

BOWDON or BOWDEN, a beautiful village situated in an extensive parish of the same name, is about one mile from Altrincham, and nine from Manchester. It stands on a commanding eminence, which embraces one of the most extensive and varied prospects in England, over a fine well-wooded undulating country. Like Altrincham, it possesses a fine rich light soil, and is unequalled for the dryness and salubrity of its situation. The facilities presented by the Railway, which has its terminus on Bowdon Downs, has within the last six years occasioned large numbers of the opulent classes of Manchester to reside here, and accordingly the whole village and its environs are studded with beautiful villas, mansions, and terraces in ornamental grounds, blooming with verdant profusion, and other tasteful luxuries of cultivated life. Bowdon has been frequently styled "The Montepellier of Manchester," from its fine air, so extremely beneficial to the aged and to invalids; and from its being such a favourite resort for excursionists and pic-nic parties, it has also been styled "The Richmond of Manchester." Also to the westward is Dunham Park, the seat of the Earl of Stamford and Warrington, to which we shall subsequently advert. The Church, which stands on a considerable elevation, is a remarkably fine old structure, and as primitive in its appearance as can well be conceived. It is said to have been erected prior to the conquest. There are several noble monuments in it to the Booth and Warrington families, amongst which one to the memory of Langham and Henry Booth, and the other to their parents, Henry Earl of Warrington and his Countess, are very beautiful. The Earl was thrice committed to the Tower of London, on accusations of high treason, and was finally acquitted by his Peers on January 14th, 1686, a day which he ever afterwards commemorated. The living is a vicarage, yielding about £500 per annum, in the patronage of the Bishop of Chester, and incumbency of the Rev. W. H. G. Mann. There is a Free Grammar school of some antiquity, but now conducted on the National system. There are about a dozen valuable bequests, which are annually disbursed in charities, educational and religious purposes. The population of Bowdon in 1851 was 1,164.

DUNHAM MASSEY, a township and village about three miles from Altrincham, and about two from Bowdon. The magnificent park known as Dunham Park, intervenes between Dunham Massey and Bowdon, and it is the favourite resort of all visitors from Manchester. The mansion of the Earl of Stamford and Warrington, is a large handsome brick structure in the quadrangular form, and beautifully embosomed in trees. The hall contains some of the finest paintings in Europe, and the collection of family plate is unrivalled in splendour and extent. There are several noble avenues of trees, radiating from the hall as a centre; these avenues are magnificent in the extreme, being nearly a mile in length; and from their regularity and the arch-like effect of their overhanging tops, may well be styled "The Cathedrals of the forest." Indeed it is not easy to imagine sylvan scenery of a more superb character than that presented by this beautiful park. Frequent allusions have been made to the supposed existence of a castle here, but not a vestige of it remains. The present hall was erected in 1730, and it appears that in the grounds of the Old Hall there was a circular mound surrounded by a moat, which from its situation left no doubt that it *was the ancient keep, and last relic of the castle of Hamo de Massey*, the first Baron previously mentioned, in respect of his charter to Altrincham. The park was formerly adorned with fine sheets of water, and about 500 head of deer, and also a fine heronry. But whether the noble owner contemplates a change with respect to his residence or not, it is not generally known, but these attractions no longer exist. The population in 1851 was 1,254.

TIMPERLEY is a township about six miles from Manchester, and two from Altrincham. The hall is a handsome building, and the situation is remarkably pleasant. The proximity to

the Railway, at which there is a neat and commodious station, is contributing materially to the prosperity of this township, by converting it into a locality for suburban residences similar to Altrincham and Bowdon. Population in 1851, 1,008.

CARRINGTON is a chapelry in the parish of Bowdon, and possessed by the Earl of Stamford and Warrington, in whom the right of presentation to the living is vested. It is a long straggling village, about four miles north-west of Altrincham. The Chapel of ease, dedicated to St. George, was erected at the expense of the patron, and consecrated in 1759. The living is a perpetual curacy, enjoyed by the Rev. George Heron, M.A. An interesting antique structure, formerly known as Carrington Hall, is now demolished. Population in 1851, 536.

ASHLEY, a small township, is principally famous for its old Hall, the ancient manorial mansion, which is remarkable for containing portraits of the ancestors of the Grosvenors, Cholmondeleys, and the other families, who formed a club during the progress of the Pretender through the north in 1745. When the expediency of joining his standard was debated, the casting vote was given by Thomas Asheaton, then Lord of the manor and mansion. This circumstance, from the powerful influence and family connexions of the parties, is considered to have decided the fate of the Pretender's enterprize. Population in 1851, 379.

LYMM is a parish and township in the Hundred of Bucklow, six miles east from Altrincham, and about the same distance south from Warrington. The Parish Church is a fine old specimen of architecture. A handsome new church, dedicated to St. Mary the virgin, was erected here in 1851, at an expenditure of £3,500. It is in the decorated style, and will seat 918 persons. From its spire a splendid view is obtained, remarkable for its picturesque beauty, which is heightened by several waterfalls from an extensive mill dam in the valley. Dane Bank, now occupied as a boarding school by Mrs. Johnson, and Oughtrington Hall, the seat of Trafford Trafford, Esq. a member of the noble family of the De Traffords, are handsome residences, commanding fine views of the surrounding country. Lymm Hall, a fine old mansion, possesses several interesting antiquities, and has stained glass windows. Opposite the gate is an antique cross mounted on steps cut out of the solid rock. There is a Free Grammar school, which was endowed by Sir George Warburton and William Dumville, Esq. in 1698. The trade of Lymm is chiefly confined to tanning leather and fustian cutting—the latter is carried on extensively. The land is generally of a light sandy nature, highly cultivated and productive, and a great portion of is appropriated to market gardening. The Bridgewater canal intersects the village, and the swift boats afford every facility to the inhabitants for the transit of their garden productions, &c., to the Manchester markets. Population of the parish 3,156.

ASHTON-UPON-MERSEY is a township and village situated in a parish of the same name, four and a half miles north from Altrincham, and seven south from Manchester. The Earl of Stamford and Warrington is Lord of the Manor, and holds his court leet here. The Parish Church, dedicated to St. Martin, is a handsome structure. The living is a rectory in the incumbency of the Rev. Charles B. Sowerby. The Wesleyans have a small chapel at New Chester, built in 1839. There are several beautiful villas in the neighbourhood. Population of the parish in 1851, including the hamlet of Cross STREET, was 1,174.

PARTINGTON is a small village and township on the northern confines of Cheshire; also in the parish of Bowdon, four miles north-west from Altrincham, and is separated from Lancashire by the river Mersey. An extensive paper manufactory, belonging to Messrs. Greaves & Co. is carried on at Mill Bank, in this township. The Wesleyan and Primitive Methodists, and Calvinists, have each places of worship here. The population in 1851 was 486.

WARBURTON is a parish and village, the latter about four miles west of Altrincham. Courts leet and baron are held here by the Warburton family, of Arley Hall, who are Lords of the manor. The Parish Church, dedicated to St. Werburgh, is one of early date, having been erected about the time of Henry VII. and is pleasantly situated on the banks of the Mersey. The living is a perpetual curacy, enjoyed by the Rev. Daniel Angutus Beaufort, M.A., who holds the living in conjunction with the second mediety of the rectory of Lymm. Three stone coffins, lying on the north side of the church, were opened about thirty years ago, and in one was found a human skeleton of extraordinary size. Warburton church was formerly a monastery of Premonstratensian monks, under the priory of Norton. This parish enjoys several unusual privileges and immunities, owing to its ancient connection with the knights of St. John and Jerusalem.

Post Office, ALTRINCHAM. John Balshaw, *Post Master*.—Letters from all parts arrive (from Manchester), every morning at half-past eight, and half-past twelve at noon, and are despatched thereto at four and half-past six in the evening.

Post Office, BOWDON, Sarah Jackson, *Post Mistress*.—Letters arrive from all parts (from Altrincham), every morning at a quarter past nine, and half-past one in the afternoon; and are despatched thereto at three, and a quarter-past five in the afternoon.

Post Office, LYMM, Thomas Fearnett, Post Master.—Letters from all parts arrive (from Warrington), every morning at nine, and are despatched thereto at half-past four in the afternoon.

Post Office, WARBURTON, Samuel Wilkinson, Post Master.—Letters arrive (from Warrington), every morning at ten, and are despatched thereto at three in the afternoon.

CHEADLE.

WITH GATLEY, NORTHEN, SALE, DIDSBURY, &c.

Cheadle is a pleasant village, of very rural and aristocratic appearance, about six miles south of Manchester, and about three miles to the west of Stockport. The parish, which is extensive, comprises the townships of Cheadle Bulkeley, Cheadle Moseley, Cheadle Hulme, and Handforth-cum-Bosden. The river Mersey flows through this parish, and the scenery is highly picturesque, and the effect is still further heightened by the numberless stately trees which adorn its banks. The manor of Cheadle belonged to a family of the same name in the twelfth century. Geoffrey de Dutton having acquired it by marriage into this family, assumed the name of Cheadle; it was afterwards held in moieties, till eventually the whole of the manor became invested in Lord Bulkeley's family. After the death of James, Viscount Bulkeley, the manor was sold by an Act of Parliament in 1756, to the Rev. Thomas Egerton, and having passed by devise to the Beresfords, was conveyed in 1806 to Mr. John Worthington. In 1810 an Act of Parliament was obtained for enclosing the waste lands in this parish.

The Church is a very ancient castellated structure, dedicated to St. Mary, and built principally in the later style of English architecture. The interior contains several noble tombs of the Brereton, adorned with effigies of knights in armour, and several other interesting memorials of antiquity. The living is now returned at £658, and is in the patronage of Sir H. D. Broughton. The
