PREFACE.



THE Proprietors in submitting the Fifth Edition of the Directory of the County of CHESHIRE trust it may be found equal in accuracy to the previous editions.

The contents are similar to those in previous editions—a general account is given of the County, with the Hundreds and Poor Law Unions; the County Magistrates are included, and a sketch of the Geological Features, by Mr. W. J. Harrison, is added: then follow, alphabetically arranged, the places in the County, with their Inhabitants, both Private Residents and Commercial; it is stated under each Parish the Division of the County, as formed under the provisions of the “Redistribution of Seats Act, 1885,” and in what Hundred, Union, and County Court District it is situated, as also the Diocese, Archdeaconry, and Rural Deanery; the Cathedral of Chester and the personnel of the Diocese being duly included, and the College and University of every Beneficed Clergyman have been given, as far as they can be ascertained; the names of the Parish Clerks are shown under each Parish; lists of Farm Bailiffs of Gentlemen farming their own land are included.

The County Council, formed under the “Local Government Act, 1888,” is included with the names and addresses of the members, and changes caused by the “Local Government Act, 1894,” have been noted.

The Manchester Ship Canal, being associated with this County, is duly treated of at the respective places it intersects, and a general description of this undertaking is also given.

The Proprietors have again to return their thanks to those Clergymen, Magistrates’ Clerks, Registrars, and other Gentlemen who have assisted the Agents while collecting the information.

ALTRINCHAM.

ALTRINCHAM (or, as it is frequently written, Altringham), is a market town and township, 30 miles north-east from Chester, 7 north-east from Knutsford, 9 west from Stockport, 8 south-south-west from Manchester, 11 east from Warrington, 18½ from Bolton, 30 from Liverpool and 193¼ from London, and is within the Altrincham division of the county, parish of Bowdon, rural deanery of Bowdon, archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester: it is also in the hundred and union of Bucklow, the latter having been formed in 1895 in place of the old Altrincham union. The town, which occupies a dry and very healthy situation, is well built, and comprises several wide streets. Altrincham is an important railway centre, and has three separate but connected stations:—Altrincham and Bowdon station, in Stamford road, near the centre of the town, belonging to the Manchester, South Junction and Altrincham railway; Peel Causeway station, at the southern extremity of the town, on the Cheshire Lines railway, and Broadheath station, north of the town, on the London and North Western line.

The Bridgewater canal, now the property of the Manchester Ship Canal Co. intersects the township for three-quarters of a mile at Broadheath.

Altrincham was constituted a Local Government District 18 Feb. 1851, under the provisions of the "Public Health Act, 1848" (11 & 12 Vict. c. 63) and was under the control of a Local Board, but under the provisions of the "Local Government Act, 1894" (56 & 57 vict. c. 73) the town is now governed by an Urban District Council.

Hamon de Massey, lord of Dunham Massey, by charter in the reign of Edward I. (circ. 1290), granted to the town the position of a free borough, instituting burgesses, and a gild merchant, and authorised the burgesses to elect a praepositus or bailiff, now styled "mayor," and this charter "is still preserved, enclosed in a circular oak case or box, shaped like an inverted cone, two or three inches in diameter." The mayor is still appointed annually at the Michaelmas courtleet of the lord of the barony, by the steward, but he possesses no magisterial authority, and his duties appear to be confined to the opening of the fairs; there is no corporate seal, chain or badge of any kind. The arms of the town are "quarterly, gu. and or. in the first quarter a lion pass. arg."

The town is lighted with gas from works at Hale Moss, about half-a-mile east, erected about 1850, and covering 4½ acres; the works are the property of a company, incorporated in 1872, and the water supply is from works at Bowdon, of the North Cheshire Water Company.

St. George's is an ecclesiastical parish, first formed out of the mother parish of Bowdon, Aug. 28, 1860, and made a separate parish in 1868.

The church, in Church street, built by subscription in 1799, and twice enlarged, is a plain structure of brick, consisting of chancel, nave, west porch and a western tower, with spire, containing one bell. There are 1,100 sittings. The register dates from the year 1799. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £297, chiefly derived from pew rents, with residence, in the gift of the vicar of Bowdon for the time being, and held since 1893 by the Rev. William Maurice Bonnor Lutener M.A. of Keble College, Oxford and surrogate. The vicarage house is near the church.

St. John the Evangelist's is an ecclesiastical parish, formed Nov. 5, 1867, out of Bowdon St. Margaret, Dunham Massey and Timperley. The church, erected in 1866, at a cost of over £8,000, is a building of stone in the Gothic style, consisting of chancel, nave, aisles, transepts, south and west porches, and a south-west tower with octagonal spire. The church affords 950 sittings, of which half are free. The register dates from the year

. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £500, net £460, with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Chester, and held since 1866 by the Rev. Frederick Wainwright M.A. of Trinity College, Cambridge.

St. Elizabeth's mission church, in Islington street, erected in 1890, and served from St. John's church, will seat 300 persons.

All Saints', Regent road, is a chapel-of-ease to St. Margarets, Dunham Massey, from which it is served, and has sittings for 300 persons.

The Catholic church of St. Vincent de Paul, in New street, erected in 1858, is a small building in the Gothic style, and will seat 350 people.

The Baptist chapel in Hale road, erected in 1875, has 450 sittings.

The Congregational chapel is in Navigation road, and there is a Congregational mission room in Oxford road.

The Methodist New Connexion chapel in George street was erected in 1820, and there is a Primitive Methodist chapel in Oxford road; the Unitarian chapel in Dunham road, erected in 1876, will seat 350 persons.

The Wesleyan chapel in Woodlands road, built in 1866 at a cost of £7,000, is of stone, in the Romanesque style, and will seat 640 persons.

Trinity mission hall, Police street, erected in 1891, is in connection with the Presbyterian church, Delamere road, Dunham Massey.

The Salvation Army hall in Shaws lane will hold 500 persons.

The Gospel hall is at 3 George street, and the Christians' meeting room in Lloyd street.

Mr. George Wood's Bible Class for Working Men meets in Pownall street.

The Altrincham Urban Council Cemetery, Hale road, opened 12th December 1894, covers an area of 10 acres, of which 5 only are at present enclosed. It contains a small chapel, which is used for all denominations and is governed by the Altrincham Urban District Council.

The Town Hall, near the Market place, erected by the Earl of Stamford and Warrington in 1849, is an edifice of red brick with stone dressings, relieved in front by a bell turret with clock; the lower portion is now used as a grain store, above which, and extending along the whole length of the building, is an assembly room 66 feet by 30, now attached to the Unicorn hotel and used occasionally for public and masonic meetings, balls and lectures.

The Market hall, in Market street, erected in 1879, at a cost of £3,000, from the designs of Mr. M. A. Roscoe, architect, of Altrincham, is of brick in the Italian style, the whole enclosing a space of about 90 feet by 60.

The market for butter and eggs is held on Tuesdays, weekly. Fairs are held on the 29th of April, 5th of August and the 22nd of November.

Cabinet making is carried on. At Broadheath are coal wharfs on the Bridgewater Canal undertaking; there are also iron foundries, timber yards, saw mills and nurseries.

An agricultural and horticultural show is held annually. The public slaughterhouses, built in 1870, are on the outskirts of the town.

The Sessions house and Police station in Dunham road, is an edifice of brick and stone erected in 1866. Attached are retiring rooms for the magistrates, police office and lock-ups, with residence for the superintendent on one side, and a parade ground at the back; on the premises is a fire bell; the County Court is also held here.

The Fire Engine station is also in Market street, and has attached a staff of 12 men under a superintendent.

Altrincham Conservative club, in Market street, erected in 1882 at a cost of £2,000, is a structure of white brick in the Italian style and contains billiard, reading, smoking, lecture and committee rooms, a bar, and a manager's residence, and has a spacious and well-kept bowling green adjoining. It is the Conservative centre for the Altrincham division of the county.

The Altrincham Free Library and Technical school, formerly the Altrincham & Bowdon Literary Institution, first established in 1847, occupies premises in George street, erected in 1852 at a cost of £800 on a site given by the Earl of Stamford & Warrington and enlarged in 1892 at a cost of £6,000; it comprises library of 6,500 volumes, reading room supplied with daily, weekly and monthly papers and periodicals and a spacious Lecture Hall, 71 feet by 36 feet, which is licensed for dramatic performances. During the winter season, Science, Art and Commercial classes are held under the Technical Instruction Acts 1889 & 1891, and in connection with the Science and Art Department of the Committee of Council on Education and the Union of Lancashire & Cheshire Institutions. An exhibition of drawings is held annually.

The Institution is managed by the Altrincham Urban Council, with the assistance of 7 honorary members.

The Altrincham Conservative Working Men's Club in Greenwood street, erected in 1887, is a spacious brick building, with manager's quarters attached.

St. John's club rooms, Islington street, in connection with St. John's church, are open every evening.

The Oddfellows Hall, Market street, originally belonging to the Altrincham Permanent Benefit Building Society, has an assembly room capable of holding 400 persons.

Charities.—The Altrincham Workhouse Trust produces £230 yearly. The Mayor's Land Charity produces about £250 a year for public uses, out of which a sum of £50 is annually given to the mayor. The Cooper's trust, of about £20, is for distribution in kind and money.

Lloyd's Fever Hospital, in Lloyd street, was erected in 1853 at a cost of £600, on a site given by the late Earl of Stamford and Warrington, as a memorial to Edward Jeremiah Lloyd, esq. of Oldfield Hall (d. 1850), and endowed by Mrs. Lloyd with a legacy of £1,000. The hospital, which in 1877 was transferred to the old Local Board of Health, is now controlled by the Urban District Council; it contains 4 wards, 2 bath rooms and sitting room, matron's and servants' apartments and the usual offices. There are 16 beds, of which only one is now (1896) occupied. The average number of patients is about 40 yearly.

The General Hospital for accidents and medical and surgical cases, in Market street, built in 1870 from designs by the late Mr. Peter Pons, of Altrincham, is a spacious edifice of brick and stone which has been considerably improved since its first erection, and now consists of board room, accident ward, men's medical and surgical wards, 3 women's wards, children's wards and one small ward. It contains 44 beds, of which 32 are now (1896)

occupied; the average number of patients for 1895 was 32. The hospital is managed by Miss Twyman, the Sister-in-charge, 6 probationer nurses and 5 other nurses, some of whom are available for attendance on out-patients. Adjoining is a Provident dispensary and hospital for outside cases.

Altrincham Eye Institution, in Market street, is a brick building, converted to its present use in 1890; it is supported by voluntary subscriptions and is open free on Tuesdays and Fridays from 1.30 to 3 p.m. and attended by Dr. Mules, of Whalley Bridge.

Stamford Public Park was formed out of Hale Moss, a piece of land given by the late Earl of Stamford and Warrington, in 1879, to the Local Board, by whom it has been laid out with walks and flower-beds, cricket and football grounds and a bathing pond formed, at a cost of £5,000, raised by a local rate.

The neighbourhood contains a great many detached villa residences, principally occupied by Manchester merchants.

Oldfield Hall, a quarter of a mile north-west, is a mansion of stone, in a park of several acres.

The Countess of Stamford and Warrington is lady of the manor and principal landowner.

The soil of the country round is well adapted for the growth of fruit and vegetables, particularly carrots and onions; the former have acquired a universal celebrity and are known as the Altrincham, or green-top, carrot.

The population of the township in 1881 was 11,249 and in 1891, 12,440; the acreage is 662; rateable value, £66,508.

ALVANLEY is a parish, township and small village, in a hilly district, 3 miles south-south-west from Frodsham and $1\frac{1}{4}$ miles from the Helsby station on the London and North Western and Great Western joint railways, in the Eddisbury division of the county, Runcorn union and county court district, hundred and petty sessional division of Eddisbury, rural deanery of Frodsham and archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. This place has furnished the title of baron to the Arderne or Arden family, but it became extinct on the death of the third baron in 1857. The church of St. John, situated near the site of an oratory, founded by Catherine Arderne in the reign of Henry VI. and erected in 1860, is a building of stone, consisting of chancel, nave of four bays, aisles, south porch and a small western turret containing 2 bells: there are four stained windows—two presented in the year 1875 by the Hon. Miss Arden of Vorley; one to George Whitley esq. who died June 8th, 1819, and Annie his wife, who died 1875, and one to the Hon. Miss Catherine Emma Arden, who died June 4th, 1834: a brass lectern was presented in 1889, by the tenants of the Countess of Haddington, who died May 29th, 1889. The church affords 220 sittings. The register dates from the year 1790. The living is a vicarage, tithe rent-charge,

£53; gross yearly value £246; net £136, with residence, in the gift of the Earl of Haddington and held since 1883 by the Rev. Edward Percy Alexander M.A. of Clare College, Cambridge. The vicarage house, erected by the late Lord Alvanley, stands on a rising ground near the village. Alvanley Castle, which stood near the church, has long disappeared, but traces of the moat remain. The Earl of Haddington owns nearly the whole of the land. The soil is sandy; subsoil, red sandstone; the chief crops are potatoes, wheat, oats and winter food for cattle. The area is 1,513 acres; rateable value, £2,550; population in 1891 was 328.

ANTROBUS is a township, and with Seven Oaks is a parish, formed in 1848 from the civil parish of Great Budworth. The township of Antrobus is $5\frac{1}{4}$ miles north-west from Northwich station, on the Cheshire Lines and London and North Western railways, and 6 south-east from Warrington, in the Northwich division of the county, hundred of Bucklow, Runcorn union, Northwich county court district, petty sessional division of Leftwich, rural deanery of Frodsham and archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. The church of St. Mark, erected in 1848, is a building of red sandstone, in the Early English style, consisting of chancel, nave, south aisle, south porch, and a small central turret, with spire, containing one bell: the chancel was beautifully decorated in 1863, and three stained windows added, at the sole expense of Samuel Higginbottom esq. of Glasgow, in memory of his wife: two other stained windows were erected in 1878, by the tenants and friends of the late Rev. George Eaton M.A. of The Pole: there are 120 sittings. The register dates from the year 1848. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £200, net £165, with residence, in the gift of the vicar of Great Budworth, and held since 1890 by the Rev. Joseph Holden of St. Aidan's. There is a Wesleyan chapel. Selby's charity of 55s. is for distribution. The Pole, the property of Gerard Lawder Eaton esq. is a fine mansion in extensive pleasure grounds, and is the seat of George Francis Cookson esq. The Crown claims the manorial rights. Sir Edmund Antrobus, bart. of Amesbury Abbey, Wilts and Gerard Lawder Eaton, esq. are the chief landowners. The soil is clayey, the subsoil, clay. The chief crops are wheat, oats and potatoes. The area of the parish is 2,745 acres, and of the township, 2,114 acres; rateable value of the

township, £3,871. The population in 1891 was—parish, 602; township, 425.

By Local Government Board Order in 1881, a detached part of Antrobus was added to Seven Oaks, and a detached part of Seven Oaks annexed to Antrobus.

BOWDON is an extensive parish and township, 9 miles south from Manchester, 7 from Knutsford, 12 from Northwich and 1 south-west from Altrincham, with a station locally in Stamford road, Altrincham, on the Manchester, South Junction and Altrincham railway, and connected also with the neighbouring stations on the London and North Western and Cheshire Lines railways, in the Altrincham division of the county, hundred and union of Bucklow, county court district of Altrincham, rural deanery of Bowdon, archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester. The town occupies a commanding eminence, affording fine views of the vale of Bollin and the surrounding country for many miles; its delightful and healthy situation, and the facilities of railway communication which it enjoys, have made it a popular place of residence for the wealthier classes of Manchester.

"The Local Government Act, 1858" was adopted 22 Jan. 1864, but the town, formerly under the control of a Local Board, is now governed by an Urban District Council, under the provisions of the "Local Government Act, 1894" (56 and 57 Vict. c. 73) and is supplied with water by the North Cheshire Water Co. The parish church of the Blessed Virgin Mary, first erected during the Saxon times, and thrice restored, according to a brass inscription in the interior, in the years 1100, 1320 and 1570, was rebuilt with enlargements, on the same site, in 1860, at a cost of £15,000, under the direction of Mr. W. H. Brakspear, architect, of Manchester, in the Transition style between the Decorated and Perpendicular periods, and is a cruciform edifice, consisting of chancel, with north and south chapels, transepts, clerestoried nave, north and south porches, and an embattled western tower, 91 feet in height, with pinnacles, and containing a clock and 6 bells: the base of the tower forms a western porch: both chapels were formerly the burying places of the Earls of Stamford and Warrington, but the present family vault is under the south or Dunham chapel: in the south or Dunham chapel is a fine mural monument with inscribed tablet, sculptures and allegorical figures to Henry 2nd Baron Delamere and 1st Earl of Warrington, tried for high treason, but honourably acquitted, 1676; ob. 2 Jan. 1693-4; and to Mary (Langham) his countess, ob. 23 March, 1690-91; here also is another large mural monument, with Ionic pillars supporting a pediment adorned with figures of cherubs, and at the back a shield of arms of 60 quarterings and two medallion portraits; on the monument is a long inscription to the Hon. Langham Booth, d. 12 May, 1724; and to the Hon. Henry Booth, M.P. for Cheshire, 1661-80, d. 2 Feb. 1726-7: in the Warrington chapel is a fine monument with recumbent effigies, to William Brereton esq. of Ashley, ob. 29 Aug. 1630, and Jane (Warburton) his wife, ob. 2 March, 1627; the figure of the former lies under an arch in the upper stage of the monument, and below, under a marble canopy, supported on pillars of the Corinthian order, is that of his wife; ten members of the Brereton family were buried here from 1570 to 1660, and the registers also record numerous baptisms: in the chancel proper is a brass to the Rev. John Kingsley M.A. formerly curate here, and some time vicar of Dunham Massey, d. Nov. 1869; and one to Ven. William Pollock D.D. vicar of Bowdon and archdeacon of Chester, d. 11 Oct. 1873; and there are other memorials to Thomas Assheton Smith esq. d. 1769, and Harriet his wife, d. 1778, and to Thomas, their son, d. 1774; and to Edward Jeremiah Lloyd esq. of Oldfield Hall, d. 3 July, 1850: the stained east window was presented by W. Nield esq. in memory of his wife, who died in 1859, and the west window, a memorial to Margaret Annie Clegg, was placed in 1854 by her parents; the large stained windows in the transepts were given by Lady Murray, of Oldfield Hall, and E. Joynson esq. of Bowdon, and there are five others, chiefly memorials: the font, presented in 1860 by Miss Joynson, con-

sists of an octagonal basin of Painswick stone, richly carved, and supported on a shaft of Devonshire marble: the brass lectern was the gift in 1891 of F. G. Napier esq.: there are 1,164 sittings in addition to those in the Dunham chapel: the churchyard was levelled and inclosed by a wall and railings in 1860. The register dates from the year 1627. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £300, net yearly value £766, with 10 acres of glebe and residence, erected in 1864, in the gift of the Bishop of Chester, and held since 1873 by the Ven. Arthur Gore D.D. of Trinity College, Dublin, examining chaplain to the Bishop of Chester, Canon Residentiary of Chester Cathedral, and surrogate. The mission church in Vicarage lane, erected in 1882, is served from the parish church. The Wesleyan chapel, Enville road, erected in 1880, at a cost, including Sunday schools and minister's house, of £20,000, is a building of stone, and will seat 630. There are two other small Wesleyan chapels, one in Vicarage lane and the other in Hale road. The charities for distribution in bread, to be given away to the poor every Sunday, and in clothing, amount altogether to about £110 yearly; George Earl of Warrington left by will dated 22 July, 1754, a sum of £5,000, now (1896, of the capital value of £5,610), invested in Consols, for apprenticing, educating or clothing poor children, or for clothing or affording other relief to aged persons; Walton's, Cooke's, and Bagshaw's charities produce £216 yearly for educational purposes and bedding. The Working Men's Conservative Club is in Priory street. The Countess of Stamford and Warrington is lady of the manor and chief landowner. The population of the township and urban district in 1891 was 2,792; the acreage, 845; rateable value, £26,408.

BRAMHALL (or Bramall) is a considerable township, in the Altrincham division of the county, parish, union, county court district and petty sessional division of Stockport and hundred of Macclesfield; 2 miles south from Stockport, with a station on the Macclesfield and Stockport branch of the London and North Western railway and another at Davenport on the Stockport and Buxton section of the same line. The mission church of St. Michael and All Angels, in connection with St. Thomas's, Stockport, was erected in 1890, and is an edifice of red brick, consisting of chancel, nave and a turret containing one bell: there are sittings for 150 persons. Here is a Baptist chapel, erected in 1856 and a Wesleyan chapel, built in 1871.

Bramhall Hall, situated on a knoll, at the intersection of two deep valleys, is one of the finest examples now extant of the timber and plaster mansions peculiar to this country. It was originally quadrangular, but the west side was removed in 1819, and the existing house comprises only the east, north and south sides, with various gabled projections annexed, differing both in width and height; the north side or wing is of the 13th century and the south wing of the 14th; the east side, now forming the central portion, was formerly much loftier, but has now lost the long gallery which was added in the reign of Queen Elizabeth and formed its upper storey; the lower stage comprises the great hall, with a tall semi-octagonal bay window at the upper end, and here also is the principal entrance, opening to the courtyard: within, a spiral oak stair leads to the drawing room, a noble Elizabethan apartment, about 36 by 30 feet, the upper portion of the wainscoting and ceiling of which is decorated with ornamental work in stucco, and also displays a number of shields of arms of the Davenports of Bramhall, showing their various alliances, and the ceiling is enriched with pendants; over the mantelpiece are the arms of Queen Elizabeth: another apartment, called "the plaster room" from the character of its decorations, was once hung with arms and armour; and the "Paradise" room till 1872 contained a bedstead, the hangings of which exhibited a complete pictured history of the "Fall of Man," worked by Dame Dorothy Davenport between 1610 and 1614; the bedstead and furniture are now the property of William Bromley-Davenport esq. M.P. of Capesthorpe, having been

purchased by him for £150: the banqueting room, 40 by 20 feet, has timbered sides painted with figures and foliage to imitate tapestry; in the centre is a fine oriel: the 14th century roof, a very fine example and in good preservation, is divided lengthways by massive arched timbers, carried alternately on uprights and on pillars supporting obtuse arches: the domestic chapel, at the south-east angle, has a flat roof supported on brackets, and much ancient painted glass, and it also contains an ancient oak stall brought from the private chapel of the Davenports in the old parish church of Stockport, temp. Richard III. and carved with royal and other badges; below the chapel is a vault, but the remains interred there have been removed to Cheadle Hulme. William Davenport esq. the last male heir, died 14th April, 1829; his great grandson, John William Handley Davenport-Handley esq. J.P. of Clipsham, Rutland, who succeeded to the estate in 1870, sold the manor of Bramhall and nearly 2,000 acres of land to the Lancashire Freeholders' Co. Limited for the sum of £190,000, when the fine series of family portraits and other relics were removed to his London residence. The Hall and park were purchased by the present occupier, Mr. Charles H. Nevill, in 1883, and the house has since been thoroughly repaired and carefully restored by the owner.

The principal landowners are the Lancashire Freeholders' Co. Limited, Manchester; Thomas Brocklehurst esq. Bamford Hesketh esq. and William Bromley Davenport esq. M.P., J.P. of Capesthorpe. The soil is mostly stiff clay, with about one-third arable; subsoil, clay. The chief crops are wheat, oats and potatoes. The area is 2,864 acres of land and 21 of water; rateable value, £21,917; the population in 1881 was 2,681.

DUNHAM MASSEY is a township and parish, formed in 1855 out of the parish of Bowdon, and comprising the hamlets of Dunham, Oldfield, Woodhouses and Sinderland; it has a station on the Altrincham and Warrington section of the London and North Western railway and is $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles west from Altrincham, in the Altrincham division of the county, Bucklow hundred and union, Altrincham petty sessional division and county court district, rural deanery of Bowdon, archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester. The Bridgewater canal, now the property of the Manchester Ship Canal Co. passes through the township. The church of St. Margaret, erected in 1853-5, at the sole cost of the late Earl of Stamford and Warrington, estimated at £20,000, and consecrated 13 June, 1855, is a fine building of stone in the Perpendicular style from designs by Mr. William Hayley, architect, of Manchester, and consists of chancel, clerestoried nave, south or Stamford chapel, aisles, transepts, south porch and a noble embattled tower with pinnacles, a ribbed spire and enriched flying buttresses, rising to an altitude of 210 feet and surmounted by a gilt cross; the tower contains a clock and 10 bells, the tenor weighing 1 ton 7 cwt. 3 qrs. and a set of 14 bells for chimes, all cast by Messrs. Taylor & Son, of Loughborough: the Stamford chapel, entered by a private door, has a richly-worked roof with pendant and is inclosed on two sides by oak screens of beautiful design: the Decorated east window, 30 by 14 feet, with rich tracery, is filled with stained glass representing prophets and saints, and all the windows in the transepts and north and east aisles contain stained glass representing different scriptural subjects: the pulpit, reredos and font are all of Caen stone, exquisitely carved; the reredos has seven divisions, each filled with an enriched canopy, the centre three projecting from and rising above the others; richly-traceried buttresses with crockets and finials support these, and the whole is surmounted by an enriched cornice and Tudor-flower battlement: the organ was enlarged in 1876: the nave has an open-framed oak roof, with curved ribs and hammer beams, at the ends of which are richly-executed figures of angels with expanded wings: the chancel roof is divided into panels with a large boss in the centre: the church is seated with open oak benches, and affords 630 sittings. The register dates from the year 1855. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £400, in the gift of the trustees of the late Earl of Stamford, and held since 1895 by the Ven. Charles Maxwell Woosnam M.A. of Trinity College, Cambridge, archdeacon of Macclesfield, and surrogate. All Saints', a chapel of ease to St. Margaret's, is in Regent road, Altrincham. The church of St. Mark, Dunham Town, erected in 1864, at a cost of £1,200, on a site granted by the late Earl of Stamford and Warrington, is a small building of stone in the Gothic style, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch and central turret containing one bell: there are 241 sittings, of which 111 are free. The register dates from the year 1864. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £22, gross yearly value £307, net £262, with residence, in the gift of the vicar of Bowdon, and held since 1893 by the Rev. Roger Kerrison Preston M.A. of St. John's College, Cambridge. Bowdon Downs Congregational chapel, erected in 1848, was enlarged in 1864, and will seat 900 persons. Trinity Presbyterian church, Delamere road, erected in 1872, is a building of stone lined with white bricks; it has a large tower and spire, and will seat 400 persons; adjoining is a Sunday school. There is a mission hall in Police street, Altrincham, in connection with this chapel.

Leicester's charity of £5 17s. yearly, founded by will in 1858, is for clothing. The Bowdon branch of the Manchester Hospital for Consumption and Diseases of the Throat, in Bowdon road, comprises 6 small wards, 4 large wards, 2 sitting rooms, dining rooms and apartments for the staff; it contains 53 beds; the average yearly number of patients for the past 3 years has been 230; the board of management consists of 17 members. Dunham Massey Hall, a handsome structure of brick surrounding a quadrangular court, is the property of the Earl of Stamford, but is now (1896) untenanted; the mansion, which contains some good family and other paintings by old masters, was rebuilt in 1721, and stands in a park of 252 acres, abounding with fine timber and adorned with several sheets of water; a herd of about 100 deer is kept here, and there is another park of 130 acres adjoining. The township contains some good residences, principally occupied by Manchester merchants. The Earl of Stamford is lord of the manor and the Countess of Stamford and Warrington is the chief landowner. The area of the township is 3,678 acres of land and 34 of water; rateable value, £28,660; population in 1891 was 2,079.

Seamon's Moss Endowed School, originally founded for 50 boys, from Altrincham, Dunham Massey & Bowdon, was formerly carried on in a large school building erected in 1759, but in 1867 new premises were built on a site adjacent, for 100 boys, & there is now (1896) an average attendance of 111: in 1883 a scheme was set forth by the Charity Commissioners for the administration of the foundation, under which a yearly sum of £90 is applied to the maintenance of scholarships & exhibitions; these comprise (1) Ten scholarships of £1, awarded annually to boys conspicuous for regularity, punctuality, progress & good conduct; (2) Five or more annual scholarships of not more than £4 each for boys who have passed Standard VII. for the purpose of studying subjects higher than elementary; (3) Three exhibitions of £20 a year, tenable for three years at any place of education higher than elementary or of technical or scientific instruction, for boys who have been not less than 3 years in the school & not less than 12 years of age: the weekly school fees are also returned at the end of the year to all boys who have been uniformly regular and punctual in their attendance & who may, therefore, in this way obtain an absolutely free education; Thomas Johnson, master

Methodist chapel, erected 1881. The soil is light and sandy and admirably adapted for market gardening, which is carried on here to a great extent, spade husbandry being principally resorted to for the cultivation of the land, in which females take an active part.

DUNHAM-ON-THE-HILL is a village, township and parish, containing the township of Hapsford, and was formed into a parish in 1888 from that of Thornton-in-the-Moors; it is on the high road between Chester and Warrington, with a station on the London and North Western and Great Western joint railway, 33 miles from Manchester, 6 north-east from Chester and 11 south-west from Warrington, in the Eddisbury division of the county, Chester Castle petty sessional division, Chester union and county court district, and in the rural deanery, archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. The church of St. Luke, erected in 1861, is a small edifice of red sandstone in the Decorated style, consisting of chancel, nave, south porch and a western turret containing one bell: there are 150 sittings. The register dates from the year 1861. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value £139, with residence, in the gift of the rector of Thornton-in-the-Moors, and held since 1888 by the Rev. Francis Stewart Banner B.A. of University College, Durham. There is a small Wesleyan chapel. The Earl of Shrewsbury and Talbot is lord of the manor and chief landowner. The soil is clay; sub-soil, rocky. The land is principally used for grazing purposes, but corn is also grown. The area of the township

is 1,404 acres; rateable value, £4,248; the population in 1891 was 287 in the township and 373 in the parish.

EASTHAM is a township, parish and village, on the river Mersey, and on the high road from Chester to Birkenhead, one mile and a half south from Bromborough station and a mile and a half north from Hooton station on the Great Western and London and North Western joint railway, a mile and a quarter south from Eastham Ferry, 9 miles north from Chester and 6 south from Birkenhead, in Wirral division of the county of Chester, higher division of the hundred and in the union of Wirral, county court district of Birkenhead, rural deanery of Wirral and archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. This place in the summer months is a favourite resort for pleasure and picnic parties from Liverpool by ferry across the river. The church of St. Mary is an ancient edifice of red sandstone, in the Early English and later styles, consisting of chancel, clerestoried nave of four bays, aisles, south porch and a western tower with octagonal broach spire, containing six bells: the nave, which is the oldest part, dates perhaps from 1280; the chancel and tower may be assigned to about 1330; and the aisles are Perpendicular, the latest portion being the Stanley chapel, at the east end of the north aisle, erected c. 1500: this chapel, entered through a beautiful oak screen, adorned with the quartered arms of the Stanleys of Hooton, has been the burying place of that family, several of whom are interred in the vault beneath: in the chapel are two altar tombs, one to Sir William Stanley kt. ob. 1612, and another, of alabaster, to Sir Rowland Stanley kt. his grandfather, ob. 1613; here also is an inscribed marble tablet to Sir Thomas Stanley Massey-Stanley bart. of Hooton park, d. 23 Aug. 1841, and to Frances (Smythe), relict of Sir Carnaby Haggerston; she died at Hooton 30 June, 1836, and this memorial was erected by her daughter and heiress, Mary, wife of Sir T. S. Massey-Stanley bart: in the chapel is a memorial window to the above, erected in July, 1877, by Sir John Stanley-Errington bart: the stained east window in the chancel is a memorial to Louisa, wife of John Torr, of Carlett Park, d. 30 Aug. 1868, and there are fifteen others, chiefly memorials, one of which, in the baptistery, replaces a

window presented in 1861 by Edward Grey esq. but since transferred to the church of St. Paul, Rhosesmor, Flintshire: in the north aisle is a marble tablet, erected by his widow, to the Rev. Thomas Trevor Trevor LL.D. prebendary of Chester, rector of West Kirby from 29 Mar. 1803, and for 30 years vicar of this parish, who died 1 Feb. 1827, and another to Captain Robert Salusbury Trevor, killed at Kabul, 23 Dec. 1841: at the east end of the south aisle are three carved panels, originally forming part of the pew of the Pool family, of Pool Hall, and bearing the quartered arms of that family: in the same aisle, cut in stone on the south wall, is a list of the bishops of Chester from 1542 to 1889, and of the bishops of Mercia and of Lichfield, or Lichfield and Coventry, from 656 to 1541, the present diocese of Chester having formerly been part of that see, and there is also a list of the vicars of Eastham: the alabaster reredos, wrought iron screen, the windows in the chancel and some other ornaments were presented in 1888 by the Rev. W. E. Torr M.A. vicar: the font, presumed to be of Saxon date, was removed to the present baptistery in 1890, and in the Stanley chapel is an oak chest of the Elizabethan period: an organ chamber and vestries were provided in 1881 by prolonging the south aisle eastwards, as a memorial from his children to John Torr esq. M.P. of Carlett park, who died 16 Jan. 1880: the interior of the church has been renovated during the years 1875, 1880, 1886 and 1890, and it will now seat 350 persons. In the churchyard is an ancient yew tree. The register dates from the year 1598. The living is a vicarage, average tithe rent-charge £280, net yearly value to present incumbent (in consequence of pension of £70, to late vicar) £166, with residence and 15 acres of glebe, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Chester, and held since 1880 by the Rev. William Edward Torr M.A. of Trinity College, Cambridge. There is a mission and lecture room, in which services are held on Sundays and Thursdays. In the centre of the village is a market cross, restored in 1891.

The Eastham steam ferry was established in 1868,

HALTON (or Haulton) is a township and village and was formed into a parish, including Norton, Stockham, Rock Savage and Astmoor, July 3, 1860, from the civil parish of Runcorn; it is in the Knutsford division of the county, Bucklow hundred, petty sessional division, union and county court district of Runcorn, and in the rural deanery of Frodsham, and archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. Halton village, standing on the top of an eminence commanding a fine view of the rivers Mersey and Weaver, is a mile and a half south-east of Runcorn, and has a station on the London and North Western and Great Western joint railways: the village is lighted with gas and supplied with water from works at Runcorn. The church of St. Mary the Virgin, standing on an eminence, is a building of red sandstone in the Gothic style, consisting of chancel, clerestoried nave of four bays, aisles, south porch and a turret on the eastern gable of the nave containing one bell: there are 415 sittings, of which 164 are free. The registers date from the year 1732. The living is a vicarage, net yearly value, £200, with 80 acres of glebe and residence, in the gift of Sir R. Marcus Brooke bart. and held since 1888 by the Rev. George Daniel Wray M.A. of Jesus College, Cambridge. The Wesleyan chapel, erected in 1877, at the cost of the late Thomas Hazlehurst esq. is a building of stone in the Gothic style, and has a tower with spire: it affords 300 sittings. A cemetery of one acre was formed in 1885 at a cost of £500, and is under the control of the parish council. Brooke's almshouses, founded in 1769 and endowed with £54 12s. yearly, are for six poor and decayed honest servants; each inmate receives 4s. weekly. Fairs and markets were formerly held here. The charities for distribution in fuel and money amount to £36 yearly, and there is also a sum of £11, for the support and repair of the library founded here in 1733 by Sir John Chesshyre kt. of Hallwood, first serjeant-at-law to George II. ob. 15 May, 1738, and buried in Runcorn church, where there is a monument: the library house is a small detached building, and over the entrance is an inscription recording the foundation and the appointment of the curate as perpetual librarian. Halton Castle, now, and for a long period in ruins, was built A.D. 1071 by Hugh de Abrincis, surnamed "Lupus," first palatine Earl of Chester: it subsequently became the property of the Crown, in right of the Duchy of Lancaster, which has still a large jurisdiction in the country included in Halton Fee, or the honor of Halton, and maintains a court of record. At the Castle inn, which stands within the ruins, courts leet have been held annually for over 700 years; attached to the inn is a good bowling green. Sir Richard Marcus Brooke bart. of Norton Priory, is lord of the manor and

chief landowner. The population of the township in 1891 was 1,555 and the acreage is 1,851 of land, 19 of water and 233 of foreshore; the rateable value, £6,054. The soil is clayey, resting on rock. The area of the parish is 5,101 acres; rateable value, £18,180; the population in 1891 was 2,647.

By Local Government Board Order 15,915 (24 March, 1884) and by the provisions of the Divided Parishes Act, 1882, part of Halton has been transferred to Runcorn.

Parochial School, for 170 children; average attendance, 134; Miss Betsy Short, mistress

ASTMOOR is a hamlet in the township of Halton, a mile and a half from Runcorn, on the Bridgewater canal.

NORTON is an agricultural township and village, with a station on the Chester and Runcorn section of the London and North Western and Great Western joint railways, 3½ miles north-east from Frodsham, 5 south-west from Warrington and 3 east from Runcorn: the township is intersected by the Bridgewater canal, now the property of the Manchester Ship Canal Co. In this township stands a lofty water tower of red sandstone, 113 feet in height, and 80 feet in diameter, erected by the corporation of Liverpool as part of their undertaking for the supply of water to that city from the great reservoir at Vyrnwy, in Montgomeryshire; the tank in the tower holds 3,000 tons (672,000 gallons) of water, which descends on the Cheshire side of the Mersey, through pipes laid in a shaft 86 feet deep, and carried under the Mersey at a point about 2½ miles from Runcorn, by means of a tunnel 900 feet in length and 10 feet wide, lined with iron; on the Lancashire side the water ascends through a similar arrangement of pipes, and is thence conveyed to Prescott. Norton Priory, the seat of Sir Richard Marcus Brooke bart. J.P. is a fine old mansion, pleasantly situated in a park of about 115 acres. The Augustinian priory of St.

TIMPERLEY is a scattered village and township, formed into a parish in 1852 from the parish of Bowdon; it is on the old road from Altrincham to Stockport, 7½ miles south from Manchester, 8½ north-north-east from Knutsford, 13 from Northwich, 1½ north from Altrincham, 1 mile west from Timperley station on the Manchester, South Junction and Altrincham railway, and near to Baguley station on the Stockport and Warrington section of the Cheshire Lines railway, in the Altrincham division of the county, east division of Bucklow hundred and union, Altrincham county court district, rural deanery of Bowdon, archdeaconry of Macclesfield and diocese of Chester. The Bridgewater canal runs through a part of the township. Christ church, erected on a site given by John Barratt esq. consecrated and opened 27 Sept. 1849, and enlarged in 1864, is an edifice of Runcorn freestone in mixed styles, consisting of chancel, nave, aisles, transepts, south porch and a western tower with spire containing one bell: the church affords 750 sittings. The register dates from the year 1849. The living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £330, net £320, with residence, in the gift of trustees, and held since 1890 by the Rev. Samuel Wilkinson M.A. of St. Catharine's College, Cambridge, and surrogate. Here is a Wesleyan Methodist chapel, built in 1846. Pickering Lodge is the residence of Mrs. Hardy, and Timperley Lodge, of William Henry Porter esq. Timperley Hall is now (1896) occupied by the Timperley Golf club. Riddings Hall, now a farmhouse, is an ancient building, approached through a stone archway and surrounded by a moat, but a great portion of the house has been modernized. Fir Tree Farmhouse is

another ancient dwelling of timber and plaster with projecting gables, and has over the doorway the date 1676. The Countess of Stamford and Warrington is lady of the manor. The representatives of the late Samuel Brooks esq. the trustees of J. Taylor esq. John Newton esq. of Altrincham, George Hardy, A. Attenbury, Robert Watson, Sydney L. Keymer, of Moatfield House, Edward and Geo. Stelfox, and Robert Preston Gill esqs. and Miss Clarke are the chief landowners. The soil is clayey, and the sub-soil marl. Market gardening is carried on to a great extent, and very large quantities of strawberries are grown here. The area of the township is 1,640 acres; rateable value, £19,420; the population in 1891 was—township, 2,461.

TINTWISTLE is a township on a long narrow penin-
 sula, in the extreme north-easterly portion of the county,
 bounded by Yorkshire on the north and Derbyshire on the
 south, on a bold acclivity commanding a fine view of a
 great part of Longdendale and of the Derbyshire Peak, 13
 miles from Manchester, 2½ north-east from Mottram, and
 a mile north-west from Hadfield station on the Manches-
 ter, Sheffield and Lincolnshire railway, Hyde division of
 the county, Macclesfield hundred, Hyde county court dis-
 trict and petty sessional division, Ashton-under-Lyne
 union, rural deanery of Mottram, archdeaconry of Mac-
 clesfield and diocese of Chester. The houses are built of
 stone, obtained from the neighbouring quarries, and
 below the village runs the Etherow stream. Christ
 church is an ecclesiastical parish formed in 1838. The
 church, erected 1837, at a cost of £2,000, is a plain edifice
 of local stone in the Early English style, consisting of
 chancel, nave, north and south porches and a western
 tower containing a clock and one bell: there are 1,100
 sittings. The register dates from the year 1838. The
 living is a vicarage, gross yearly value £300, net £250,
 with residence, in the gift of trustees, and held since
 1873 by the Rev. Robert Smith B.A. of Trinity College,
 Dublin. There is a Congregational chapel seating 800
 persons, and a Wesleyan chapel, erected in 1830, with 250

sittings; connected with it is a Young Men's Institute.
 Tintwistle Hall, formerly a timber-framed mansion, but
 rebuilt of stone in 1653, was anciently the seat of the
 De Burgh family, then lords of this manor. The principal
 landowners are Lord Tollemache and the Countess of
 Stanford and Warrington. The area of Tintwistle town-
 ship is 14,083 acres of land and 327 of water; the area
 of the Cheshire portion is 11,850 acres; rateable value,
 £19,767; the population in 1891 was 3,705, of which
 2,116 were in Cheshire.

ARNFIELD is a small hamlet, half a mile to the north
 of Tintwistle.
