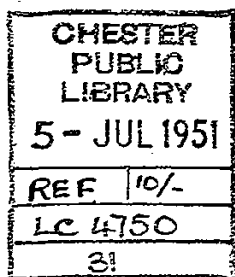

ALTRINCHAM.

ALTRINCHAM, or ALTRINGHAM, is a township and thriving market town in the parish of Bowdon, and the union to which it gives its name, containing, by the census of 1861, 6628 inhabitants, and 657 acres; in the hundred of Bucklow, east division of the deanery of Frodsham, archdeaconry and diocese of Chester, North (Cheshire; 7 miles north from Knutsford, 7 west from Stockport, $11\frac{1}{2}$ east from Warrington, 8 south-west from Manchester, 25 from Liverpool, 30 from Chester, and 193 from London. Situated in a most delightful part of the county, having the advantage of railway communication in every direction, and adjoining the township of Bowdon, one of the most fashionable retreats of the Manchester merchants, Altrincham is a rapidly improving town, the population having nearly doubled during the last twenty years—the returns in 1841 being only 3372. The principal business streets are Railway Street, George Street, and Church Street; the township extending from Broadheath on the north to Peel Causeway on the south, a distance of nearly two miles. The Town Hall is a spacious brick building, in the Market Place, in the lower portion of which the butter market is held; and the upper portion is used for the magistrates' meetings, court leets, and other public business: the magistrates hold Petty Sessions there every Tuesday, which is also the market-day. The Manchester South Junction and Altrincham Railway have two stations here—the Altrincham station for goods and passengers, and the Bowdon station for passengers only; and the Warrington and Stockport line has a station at Broadheath. The Bridgewater Canal also passes through the north end of the town, thus affording water communication with all parts of the country.

The extensive market gardens with which this country abounds afford the principal employment to the labouring classes, and from their proximity to Manchester have every facility for disposing of the produce. The Altrincham carrots have a world-wide fame, being the principal in request with every farmer throughout the kingdom.

By charter, 18th Edward I., Hamon de Massey, lord of Dunham, the then lord of the manor, obtained leave to hold a market here on a Tuesday, and a fair for three days, on the eve, the day, and the morrow of the Feast of the Assumption, and granted a charter creating Altrincham a free borough, which has now become obsolete; but in consequence of a yearly payment of £5 (which was exchanged for land of the same value) having been granted to the mayor of Altrincham at some remote period by the lord of the manor, a mayor and other officers are still annually appointed at the Michaelmas court leet, but they possess no magisterial or municipal functions,—the mayor's duty appearing to be only that of receiving the rent of the land, which contains 13a. 1r. 20 p., and produces about £80 per annum, which is usually expended in dinners, &c., at the courts leet, but the illuminated clock and the drinking fountains in Market Square have been erected out of the funds. The lands are now vested in the Trustees of Charities, with a view to their appropriation to some more useful purpose in the town. A Local Board of Health was formed in 1851, which is composed of nine members, who hold their meetings monthly at the Town Offices in High Street. The Altrincham and Bowdon Literary Institution is a handsome building, in Well Street, containing an excellent library and reading room, which is supplied with the principal papers and periodicals of the day. The Directors contemplate an enlargement of the building, which is intended to include a lecture room, 57 feet by 35 feet, at a cost of about £600, and subscriptions amounting to nearly £400 have already been promised.

The Church is a plain brick edifice, in Church Street, dedicated to Saint George, which was erected in 1799, and enlarged in 1858, and again in 1861; it has accommodation for about eleven or twelve hundred persons. A new church, to be erected in Ashley Road is in contemplation. The living is a perpetual curacy, valued at £340 per annum, with residence, in the incumbency of the Rev. George London, M.A., and the patronage of the vicar of Bowdon. The Jubilee National Schools, for boys, girls, and infants, with house for the master, adjoin the churchyard, and were erected in 1860, in the place of the old ones, which were erected to commemorate the jubilee of the late King George III. The

Congregationalists, New Connexion, Primitive Methodists, Roman Catholics, Unitarians, and Wesleyans, have each of them places of worship here, with Sunday Schools attached. The schools for boys and girls in Ashley Road, and for infants in Albert Street, are in connection with St. Margaret's Church, Dunham Massey. The British School is held in new and spacious premises off Ashley Road, which were erected by subscription in 1860, at a cost of £2500. The Earl of Stamford and Warrington is lord of the manor.

CARRINGTON is a township of Bowdon parish, Altrincham union, containing, by the census of 1861, 521 inhabitants, and 2333 acres; in the hundred of Bucklow, east division of Frodsham deanery, archdeaconry and diocese of Chester, North Cheshire; 4 miles north-west from Altrincham, $8\frac{1}{2}$ from Manchester, and 11 from Warrington, on the south bank of the river Mersey, which divides it from Lancashire. The meadow land in this township, and the adjacent ones of Partington and Ashton, is submerged from the Mersey, by sluices for that purpose, during a portion of the year, which has the effect of rendering it very productive. DUNHAM MASSEY, with the hamlets of **OLDFIELD**, **SINDERLAND**, and **WOODHOUSES**.

DUNHAM MASSEY is an extensive township, in Bowdon parish, Altrincham union, containing, by the census of 1861, 1535 inhabitants, and 3470 acres; in the hundred of Bucklow, deanery of Frodsham, archdeaconry and diocese of Chester, North Cheshire, $\frac{3}{4}$ miles from Bowdon Station, and 3 south-west from Altrincham. The living is a perpetual curacy, valued at £80 per annum, in the incumbency of the Rev. John Kingsley, M.A., and the patronage of the Earl of Stamford and Warrington. The Church, which was consecrated on the 13th June, 1845, is situated on the road from Knutsford to Altrincham, and was erected at the expense of the Earl of Stamford and Warrington; it is dedicated to St. Margaret, and consists of north and south aisles, transepts, chancel, and a lofty nave, lighted by clerestory windows; it is in the perpendicular English style, with a noble tower, surmounted by an elegant spire, with flying buttresses. The tower contains a magnificent peal of ten bells, the largest of which bears the following inscription:—

"As queen of queens, Victoria reigns:
 I sit as queen o'er Music's strains.

And may her subjects loyal be
 As mine!—we dwell in harmony."

The district comprising the ecclesiastical parish of St. Margaret extends from the church to Bowdon lodge, thence by the Altrincham and Chester road to Lower Houses in Oldfield, and contained, by the census of 1861, 4569 inhabitants, and 865 inhabited houses. There are excellent schools for children of both sexes and infants, which were built upon land presented by the Earl of Stamford and Warrington, who is lord of the manor.

DUNHAM MASSEY HALL, the seat of Earl Stamford and Warrington, is a handsome quadrangular building, in the midst of a splendid park of upwards of 400 acres, well stocked with deer, and containing several fine sheets of water. The House contains a fine collection of magnificent paintings by the old masters.

OLDFIELD is a hamlet of this township, containing an Endowed Free School for the instruction of fifty children of Bowdon, Dunham, and Altrincham.

SINDERLAND and WOODHOUSES are also hamlets of this township.

TIMPERLEY is a township of Bowdon parish, Altrincham union, containing, by the census of 1861, 1571 inhabitants, and 1628 acres; in Bucklow hundred, east division of Frodsham deanery, archdeaconry and diocese of Chester, North Cheshire; 1½ miles east from Altrincham, 8½ north-east from Knutsford, and 8 south from Manchester. The Bridgewater Canal runs through the township, and the Manchester South Junction and Altrincham Railway has a station here. The new line, which is now in progress from Stockport, and which will shortly be completed, is a continuation of the Stockport and Warrington branch of the London and North Western Railway, and when finished, will render the communication between Liverpool and Stockport, and all places east from thence, much more direct. The town is lighted with gas by the Altrincham Gas Company, and water is supplied from the North Cheshire Water Works Company. The living is a perpetual curacy, valued at £210 per annum, with residence, in the incumbency of the Rev. Edward Dowling, M.A., and the patronage of trustees. The Church is a neat edifice, which was erected in 1849; it is dedicated to our Saviour, and consists of nave, chancel, and side aisles, with a tower surmounted by a spire. There is a good National School, with residence for the master. An Infant School was erected in 1862; it is also used as a reading room and library, which is open every evening (Sundays excepted) from 7 to 9 o'clock, and lectures are occasionally given in connexion therewith. The Wesleyans have a place of worship here. The Earl of Stamford and Warrington is lord of the manor.
