ALTRINCHAM.

ALTRINCHAM (or, as it is frequently written, ALTRINGHAM), 30 miles north-east from Chester, 7 north-east from Knutsford, 9 west from Stockport, 8 south-south-west from Manchester, 11 east from Warrington, 18½ from Bolton, 30 from Liverpool and 193½ from London, is a market, union, railway town and polling place for Mid Cheshire, is a township and chapelry in the parish of Bowdon, hundred of Bucklow, rural deanery of Frodsham East, archdeaconry of Chester and diocese of Chester. The town, consisting of several wide and open streets, is well built, and in the vicinity are some handsome villas; the situation is dry and very healthy, the streets are paved, clean and well lighted with gas, and there is a good supply of water from the North Cheshire Water Company. The Manchester South Junction and Altrincham railway adds greatly to the convenience of the district: there are three stations; the Altrincham one in the Stockport road joins the Cheshire lines to Knutsford, Northwich, Chester, Stockport and Liverpool; another situated in Railway street, at the southern extremity of the town, is termed the Bowdon station, being principally for the accommodation of the inhabitants of Bowdon and Dunham Massey; and the Broadheath station at the northern extremity of the town on the London and North Western line to Warrington, Garston and Liverpool.

The Bridgewater canal intersects the township for three-quarters of a mile at the northern entrance of the town, called Broadheath.

The Local Board of Health meet monthly, on the first Friday, at their office, High street.

The mayor is appointed annually at the Michaelmas court leet of the lord of the barony, a charter making it a free borough having been granted to Altrincham in the reign of Edward I. about the year 1290.

St. George's is an ecclesiastical parish formed out of the mother parish of Bowdon in 1860.

The church is a plain, commodious brick building, situated in Church street: it was built in 1799 by subscription, and has been twice enlarged, and now consists of chancel and nave, with tower and spire. The living is a vicarage, yearly value £360, in the gift of the vicar of Bowdon for the time being, and held by the Rev. George London, of St. Aidan's. The vicarage house is near the church; also the National schools for boys, girls and infants. There are also mixed schools in connection with the church.

St. John's is also an ecclesiastical parish formed in 1867. The church of St. John the Evangelist, consisting of chancel, nave and aisles, transepts, tower with spire, is a stone structure in the Gothic style, built by public subscription at a total cost of over £8,000: it has accommodation for 940 people, with the distinct understanding, which is expressed in the deed, that half the seats are to be free. The living is a perpetual curacy, yearly value nearly £400 with residence, in the gift of the Bishop of Chester, and held by the Rev. Frederick Wainwright, M.A. of Trinity College,

Cambridge. Adjoining the church are the National mixed schools; the infant school is used for mission service in connection with St. John's.

The British school in Oxford road was erected in 1860 at a cost of £2,400.

The Roman Catholic chapel of St. Vincent de Paul is a small Gothic building erected in 1858: it will seat near 400 people; there is also a day school in connection.

The Wesleyan chapel in Bank street is a handsome structure in the Byzantine style; it was built in 1866 at a cost of £4,000. The New Connexion Methodist chapel is in George street, the Primitive Methodist in Oxford road, the Congregational in Chapel road, the Unitarian chapel in Dunham road, the Baptists have a small chapel on the Downs. There are Sunday schools in connection with most of these places of worship.

The Town Hall, near the Market place, is a red brick building with stone dressings, erected by the munificence of the Earl of Stamford and Warrington in 1849; the lower portion is used for the sale of butter, poultry, eggs &c.; above that, extending the whole length of the building, is a large assembly room 66 feet by 30, used occasionally for public meetings, balls, lectures &c.: the front is ornamented by a bell turret and clock. A new market is about to be erected.

The Sessions house and Police station in Market street was erected in 1866: it is fitted up with every convenience. Attached are retiring rooms for the magistrates, &c. police office and lock-ups, with residence for the superintendent on one side, and a parade ground at the back; a fire bell is now placed here. The petty sessions are held here on the first and third Mondays in each month, at Sale on second and fourth Monday, and at Lymm on the third Friday.

The county court is held at the Sessions house once a month, and comprises within its jurisdiction the following townships: Agden, Altrincham, Ashley, Ashton-upon-Mersey, Baguley, Bexton, Bollin Fee, Bollington, Bowdon, Carrington, Dunham, Massey, Fulshaw, Hale, High Leigh, Knutsford Inferior, Knutsford Superior, Marthall with Little Warford, Mere, Millington, Moberley, Ollerton, Partington, Pownall Fee, Rostherne, Sale, Tabley Superior, Tatton, Timperley, Warburton and Wilmslow.

The market for butter and eggs is held on Tuesdays. Fairs are held on the 29th of April, 6th of August and the 22nd of November.

The Altrincham union consists of the following townships: - Agden, Altrincham, Ashley, Ashton, Ashton-by-Budworth, Baguley, Bexton, Bollin Fee, Bollington, Bowdon, Carrington, Dunham Massey, Fulshaw, Hale, High Leigh, Knutsford Inferior, Knutsford Superior, Lymm, Marthall, Mere, Millington, Moberley, Northen, Northen Etchells, Ollerton, Partington, Peover In-

ferior, Peover Superior, Pickmere, Plumley, Pownall Fee, Rostherne, Sale, Tabley Inferior, Tabley Superior, Tatton, Timperley, Toft and Warburton. The Union House is at Knutsford.

Lloyd's Fever hospital is a brick building, erected in 1853 at the extreme point of Lloyd street in commemoration of Edward Jeremiah Lloyd, esq. of Oldfield hall, at a cost of £600 raised by private subscription, Mrs. Lloyd contributing £300, upon land given for that purpose by the Earl of Stamford and Warrington; Mrs. Lloyd also left a legacy of £4,000 to endow it. This hospital was handed over to the Local Board of Health in 1877.

A new hospital was built in Chapel road in 1870, the dispensary was then removed from Lloyd hospital to it it is supported by subscriptions.

The Altrincham and Bowdon Literary Institution is an Elizabethan brick building, erected on a site given by the Earl of Stamford and Warrington in 1832 at a cost of £800, raised by subscription: it was established in 1847. The library contains 2,390 volumes; the reading-room is well supplied with daily, weekly and monthly papers, periodicals &c.; in connection with the institution are educational, botanical, horticultural, science and art classes, the latter in connection with South Kensington. An exhibition is held annually, of drawings and paintings.

Here are some good boarding schools; cabinet making is carried on. At Broadheath are some coal wharfs belonging to the Bridgewater Navigation Company, iron foundries, timber yards and saw mills; there are also some large nurseries.

The soil of the country round is well adapted for the growth of fruit and vegetables, particularly carrots and onions; the former have acquired a universal celebrity, and are known as the Altrincham, or green-top carrot.

An agricultural and horticultural show is held annually. The public slaughterhouses are on the outskirts of the town.

The neighbourhood contains a great many handsome detached villa residences, principally occupied by Manchester merchants.

Oldfield Hall, a quarter of a mile north-west, the seat of John Allen, esq. J.P. is a handsome stone building situated in a park of several acres.

There are various charities for the poor, amounting to about £40 yearly.

The Earl of Stamford and Warrington is lord of the manor and principal landowner.

The population of the township in 1861 was 6,628 and in 1871, 8,478; the acreage is 657; the rateable value is £49,114, and the gross value £56,203.

The chief crops are wheat, oats and potatoes. Selby's charity of 32s. is for distribution, and there are other charities of 10s. yearly value. The Pole, the seat of Major-General Gerard Potter Eaton, is a fine building situated in extensive pleasure grounds. The Crown claims the manorial rights. Sir E. Antrobus and Major-General Gerard Potter Eaton are the chief landowners; the soil is clayey, the subsoil clay. The area of the ecclesiastical parish is 2,579 acres, and of the township 2,086 acres; rateable value of ecclesiastical parish

£5,467; township, £4,065; gross estimated rental of ecclesiastical parish, £6,101; township, £4,535; the population in 1871 was—ecclesiastical parish, 653½; township, 495.

BOWDON is an extensive parish, comprising the following townships:—Agden, Altrincham, Ashley, Baguley, Bollington, Bowdon, Carrington, Dunham Massey, Hale, Partington, and Timperley, in the Mid division of the county, hundred of Buckley, Altrincham union and county court district, East Frodsham rural deanery, Chester archdeaconry and diocese. The parish church of the Blessed Virgin Mary was first erected during the Saxon times, and has been thrice restored, according to a brass inscription in the interior, in the years 1320 and 1520, and rebuilt and enlarged in 1860, on the same site, and to some extent upon the old foundations; all the architectural features of any value have been reproduced and it is now one of the most beautiful and imposing churches in the county; the general architectural character is between the Perpendicular and the Third Pointed period, with Tudor windows in the aisles; the arcades of the nave have been extended in their span, the aisles and chapels being of unusual width; they are spanned by two arches, each opening into the transepts, of similar design to those of the nave; the clerestory is of good elevation, pierced with three-light traceried windows over each arch, to harmonise with those of the aisles; those over the arches of the transepts and chancel, two in each case, are of two lights only, but arched and traceried; the west windows of the aisles, the large transept and chancel windows are all of five lights, the north and south windows of the chapels and chancel of three lights; all have Pointed arches, and filled in with rich tracery: the two chapels were formerly the mortuary chapels of the Earls of Stamford and Warrington; under the south or Dunham chapel is the present family vault, containing many relics of the rich and beautiful lead coffins of ancient days; there are three principal and two inferior entrances; the principal one through the tower has a deeply recessed and arched doorway; there is a small private entrance porch in the angle of the Dunham chapel: the height of the tower is 91 feet, which contains a peal of 6 bells and a clock: the east window of the chancel is a rich stained window, erected by W. Neild, esq. in memory of his wife: the gallery or tower window is also a stained memorial window, erected by Mr. Clegg: the two large transept windows are also stained, one representing the Miracles, the other the Parables of our Lord, erected by Lady Murray and E. Joynson, esq.; there is also a small memorial window in the chancel, erected by D. Nicholls, esq. and others: the organ is in the north chapel, having the vestry behind it: the font is octagonal and rich in character, executed in Painswick stone; the basin rests on a Devonshire marble shaft; this is the gift of Miss Joynson; the oak lectern is the gift of Miss Pollock: the lighting is effected by polished brass coronæ for gas, suspended from the roof. The burial ground about the church has been levelled, and enclosed with a dwarf

wall and light iron railings, and provided with entrance gates. W. H. Brakspear, esq. of Manchester, was the architect. The entire cost of the building was £12,371 16s. 7d. It contains 1,164 sittings, in addition to the accommodation for the Earl of Stamford and Warrington. There are handsome marble monuments and tablets, principally to the Breretons, Asshetons, Booths and Langhams, members of the Stamford and Warrington family, also one erected by the inhabitants of this neighbourhood to the memory of E. Jeremiah Lloyd, of Oldfield Hall, who died July 3rd, 1850, aged 50. The register dates from the year 1630. The living is a vicarage, the tithes of which are commuted at £401; there are also fees, lands, and endowments amounting to £900, with an excellent vicarage house, erected in 1864; it is in the presentation of the Bishop of Chester, and held by the Rev. Arthur Gore, M.A. of Trinity College, Dublin, Hon. Canon of Chester and Chaplain to the Bishop. There are also chapels for Wesleyans; a new one is now (1878) being erected. A free grammar school was founded in the seventeenth century by a Mr. Edward Vawdrey, who bequeathed £4 per annum to it; the school-house is a plain but commodious building, rebuilt at the expense of the parish in 1806. New national schools have been built. The Bowdon Skating Rink is in Hale, near Peel Causeway; it is an iron structure, built in 1877. The charities are very numerous, several benefactors having left by will bread to be given away to the poor every Sunday for ever; clothing is also distributed occasionally, altogether about £100 yearly; in addition the Earl of Warrington's charity of £168 yearly, for apprenticing, educating or clothing poor children, or clothing or other relief to aged persons. Walton's charity of £130 yearly for educational purposes. The Local Board for Bowdon meet the last Monday in the month, at the school-room. The Earl of Stamford and Warrington is lord of the manor and chief landowner. The population of the township in 1871 was 2,262; the acreage is 1,370; rateable value £26,000. The entire parish has 17,971 acres, with a population of 19,744.

BRAMHALL (or BRAMALL) is a considerable township, in the Eastern division of the county, parish, union and county court district of Stockport, and hundred of Macclesfield; 2 miles south from Stockport. The Macclesfield branch of the London and North Western railway intersects the township and has a station here. Bramhall Hall, for many years the seat of the Davenport family, now belonging to the Freehold Company Limited, Manchester, and at present unoccupied, is a fine old mansion of timber and plaster, painted black and white, and is picturesquely situated on the knoll of a hill, at the foot of which runs a small rivulet. The principal landowners are the Freeholders' Company Limited, Manchester; Thomas Brocklehurst, esq; Bamford Hesketh, esq. and William Bromley Davenport, esq., M.P. The soil is mostly stiff clay, with about one-third arable; subsoil clay. The chief crops are wheat, oats and potatoes. The area is 3,250 acres; rateable value, £10,018; the population in 1871 was 1,960.

DUNHAM MASSEY is a township and ecclesiastical parish, formed in 1855 out of the parish of Bowdon, comprising the hamlets of Dunham, Oldfield, Woodhouses, and Sinderland, in the Mid division of the county, Bucklow hundred, Altrincham union and county court district, East Frodsham rural deanery, Chester archdeaconry and diocese, situated on the turnpike road from Altrincham to Knutsford, having a station on the London and North Western railway, and 1½ miles west from Altrincham. The Bridgewater canal passes through, and the Bollin river bounds it on the south. The church of St. Margaret, consecrated on the 13th of June, 1855, was built from the designs of Mr. William Hayley, architect, of Manchester, at the sole expense of the Earl of Stamford and Warrington; estimated to have cost twenty thousand pounds: it is in the Perpendicular English style, and has a noble embattled tower and pinnacles, with a ribbed spire and enriched flying buttresses, rising to an altitude of 210 feet, surmounted by a gilt cross, and may be seen from a considerable distance; the tower contains a peal of 10 bells, the largest bearing the following inscription—

“As queen of queens, Victoria reigns:
 I sit as queen o’er Music’s strains.
 And may her subjects loyal be
 As mine!—we dwell in harmony.”

The weight of this bell is 1 ton 7 cwt. 3 qrs.; the whole peal weighs 6 tons 3 cwt. 2 qrs. 10 lbs.: a set of 14 bells for chimes has been cast, thus making nine tons of bell-metal in the tower; they are the production of Messrs. Taylor and Son, of Loughborough: the exterior of the church is of wallstone, from the neighbourhood of Sheffield, with ashlar stone dressings, from Hollington; the interior is also Hollington stone; it con-

sists of chancel, a lofty nave (lighted by clerestory windows), aisles and transepts; on the south side is the Stamford chapel, entered by a private door and lighted by two windows of two lights each; the ceiling has a richly-worked pendant attached to the roof and is enclosed on two sides by oak screens of beautiful design; the east window, of seven lights, is in the Decorated English style, and points to the reign of Edward III., 1377, with transoms and mullions, the tracery of which is very rich; it is 30 feet by 14, and is filled with stained glass and contains beautifully-executed representations, in the upper division, of our Saviour; in the centre, St. John the Baptist, St. Matthew, St. Mark, St. Luke, St. John the Evangelist, and St. Peter; lower division, St. Paul, in the centre, Moses, David, Isaiah, Jeremiah, Daniel, and Malachi; the principal entrance is under the west window, which is of five lights filled in with tracery, and is of stained glass; the other entrance is through a porch on the south side; the pulpit, reading desk, reredos, and font are all of Caen stone, exquisitely carved, more particularly the reredos, which is divided into seven parts, answering to the seven-light window above; each part is an enriched canopy, and three of the centre compartments project from and rise above the others, and are supported by richly-traceried buttresses with crockets and finials, the whole being surmounted by an enriched cornice and Tudor-flower battlement; at each end is a niche with a very rich canopy, crocketed pinnacles and finials; in these niches are very finely-executed carved figures representing angels on pedestals: the organ was enlarged in 1876; it is placed in the north transept, and is a powerful and fine-toned instrument; the church is lighted with gas from standards of a beautiful

design, arranged on each side of the nave in advance of the piers; the lighting throughout is perfect, and in accordance with the style of the church; the roof of the nave is of oak, open framed, with curved ribs and hammer beams, at the ends of which are richly-executed figures representing angels with expanded wings; the seats are also of oak, with open ends, and furnished with cushions; the ceiling of the chancel, which perfectly accords with the style, is divided into panels, having a large boss in the centre compartment; the floor of the communion is of encaustic tiles of beautiful pattern; those of the nave, aisles, and chancel are of polished stone and black marble dots. The living is a vicarage, yearly value £80, in the gift of the Earl of Stamford and Warrington and held by the Rev. Richard Hodgson, M.A. Queen's College, Oxford. The church of St. Mark is a small Gothic structure, consisting of chancel, nave, and aisle, erected on a site granted by the Earl of Stamford and Warrington, at Dunham Town, in 1864; the cost of the building was upwards of £1,200, defrayed by subscription. The living is a vicarage, annual value £150 and house, in the gift of the vicar of Bowdon, and held by the Rev. John Burrows, M.A. of Trinity College, Dublin; here is also a small school. Leicester's charity of £5 17s. yearly is for clothing. The Hall, a handsome brick quadrangle, is the property of the Earl of Stamford and Warrington, and at present occupied by Robert Platt, esq. J.P.; it was rebuilt in 1721, and contains some good family and other paintings by the old masters; it is situated in a park of 252 acres, abounding with fine timber, and adorned with several sheets of water; a herd of about 500 deer is kept here; there is another park of 130 acres adjoining. The township contains some handsome mansions, principally occupied by Manchester merchants. The Earl of Stamford and Warrington is lord of the manor and chief landowner. The acreage of the township is 3,470; rateable value, £13,995; population, 1,790; population of the ecclesiastical parish, 3,283; rateable value, £23,784.

HALTON (or HAULTON) is a township and ecclesiastical parish including Norton, Stockham, Rock Savage and Astmoor, formed in 1860 from the mother parish of Runcorn in the union and county court district of Runcorn, in the Mid division of the county, Bucklow hundred, rural deanery of Frodsham, archdeaconry and diocese of Chester. Halton village is a mile and a half south-east of Runcorn, situated on the top of an eminence, and commands a fine view of the rivers Mersey and Weaver, having a station on the London and North Western and Great Western Chester and Birkenhead and Chester and Manchester Joint lines. The church of St. Mary stands on an eminence; it is a red stone Gothic building consisting of chancel, nave, aisles and bell turret containing 1 bell. The registers date from the year 1732. The living is a vicarage, yearly value £200, with residence, in the gift of Sir R. Brooke, bart. and held by the Rev. John Lockwood of St. Bees. There are chapels for Primitive Methodists and Wesleyans; the latter is a handsome stone building with a spire. There is a Grammar school for boys, endowed with £40 yearly; the appointment of master is vested in Sir Richard Brooke, bart. who is also trustee with the vicar of Runcorn. Brooke's almshouses are for six poor and decayed honest servants, founded in 1769 and endowed with £54 12s. per annum; each inmate receives 4s. weekly. The charities for distribution amount to £36 yearly. Fairs and markets were formerly held here. There are some very extensive stone quarries worked. Halton Castle, now, and for a long period in ruins, was built A.D. 1071 by Hugh Lupus, Earl of Chester, who gave the barony to his cousin Nigel; from his posterity it came to the Crown, and is a considerable member of the Duchy of Lancaster, which maintains a large jurisdiction in the country round by the name of Halton Fee, or the honors of Halton, having a court of record. The Castle inn adjoins the ruins, and has a good bowling green. Sir Richard Brooke, bart. J.P. is lord of the manor and chief landowner. The population of the township in 1871 was 1,620 and the acreage is 1,770; the rateable value is £6,623. The soil is clayey, resting on rock. The area of the ecclesiastical parish is 4,912 acres; rateable value £16,249; the population in 1871 was 1,756.

Astmoor is a hamlet in the township of Halton, a mile and a half from Runcorn, on the Duke of Bridgewater's canal.

J.P. is lord of the manor and sole landowner. The soil and the subsoil are clay. The area is 2,047 acres; rateable value £5,624; the population in 1871 was 394.

TIMPERLEY is $7\frac{1}{4}$ miles south from Manchester, $8\frac{1}{2}$ north-north-east from Knutsford, 13 from Northwich, a mile and a half north from Altrincham, situated on the Stockport road; it is a mile west from Timperley station; Baguley station is near the village; it is a township in Bowden parish, Mid division of the county, east division of Bucklow hundred, Altrincham union and county court district, Frodsham deanery, Chester archdeaconry and diocese, situated on the old road from Altrincham to Stockport. The Bridgewater Canal runs through a part of the township in a line parallel to the railway. The village is scattered; there are a great many villa residences throughout the township; it is an ecclesiastical parish, formed in 1852. Christ church is a stone building in Mixed style, consecrated and opened for divine service September 27th, 1849, and enlarged in 1864; it is built of freestone from the Kuncorn quarries, and is erected on a rather elevated site, devised by the late John Barratt, esq.; it consists of chancel, nave, aisles, north and south transepts, tower, and a spire which can be seen from a considerable distance; it contains a good-toned organ. The living is a vicarage, yearly value £200, with residence, in the gift of trustees; the Rev. Edward Dowling, M.A., of Trinity College, Dublin, is the incumbent. The National school for boys and girls near the church is a handsome and commodious white brick building, with residence adjoining, capable of accommodating 200 children, erected at a cost of £1,000 in 1855. The Sunday school is held here; the Infants' school is in the village, and was erected in 1873 at a cost of £1,500. The Wesleyan

Methodists have a chapel here, built in 1846. There are charities of about £20 yearly value. Riddings Hall is an ancient farmhouse, approached through an arch of stone, and surrounded by a moat; a great portion of the house has been modernised. Pickering Lodge, the residence of George Hardy, esq.; Timperley Lodge, of Abraham Attenbury, esq.; and Timperley Hall, of George Cooper, esq. are large mansions. Fir Tree Farm presents an antique appearance, being of timber and plaster, with projecting gables; it has the date 1676 over the doorway. The Earl of Stamford and Warrington is lord of the manor. The representatives of the late Samuel Brooks, J. Taylor, John Newton, George Hardy, W. E. D. Cooper, A. Attenbury, and John Skelton, esqrs. are chief landowners. The soil is clayey, and the subsoil marl. Market gardening is carried on to a great extent, and very large quantities of strawberries are grown here. The population in 1861 was 1,571, and in 1871 2,112; the acreage is 1,446; the rateable value £16,096.

TINTWISTLE, with the Hamlets of Arnfield and Woodhead, or Longdendale,

Is an ecclesiastical parish, formed in 1838 from the mother parish of Mottram-in-Longdendale; it is divided into four hamlets—Tintwistle, Micklehurst, Arnfield, and Woodhead, and is in the Eastern division of the county, Macclesfield hundred and deanery, Ashton-under-Lyne union, Chester archdeaconry and diocese. The village of Tintwistle, distant 13 miles from Manchester, 2½ miles north-east from Mottram, and a mile north-west from Hadfield station on the Manchester, Sheffield and Lincolnshire railway, is pleasantly situated on a bold acclivity, at the foot of which runs the Etherow, and it commands a fine view of a great part of Longdendale and of the Derbyshire Peak. The houses are built of stone, obtained from the neighbouring quarries, and are adapted for resisting the strong winds and heavy rains to which the vicinity is sometimes exposed. Christ church is a plain edifice in the Early English style, erected in 1837, at a cost of £2,000, and will seat 1,000 persons; it consists of chancel and nave. The living is a vicarage, yearly value £200, vested in trustees, and held by the Rev. Robert Smith, B.A. of Trinity College, Dublin. Near the church are National schools, built in 1840; also a handsome Sunday school, built by the late Mrs. James Sidebottom. The Congregationalists have had a congregation in this village for nearly 200 years; their chapel will seat 800. Tintwistle Congregational school is a spacious building, erected in 1819; the lower part is occupied during the week as a British school: it is under Government inspection, and has a small endowment, left by John Rhodes, for the education of six poor children. The Wesleyan chapel will accommodate 250, and is supplied by ministers from the Glossop circuit; connected with it there is a Young Men's Institute. Tintwistle Hall, formerly a wooden building, was anciently the seat of the De Burgh family, formerly lords of the manor; it was rebuilt of stone in 1653. The great lordship of Longdendale was formerly esteemed the paramount lordship of the whole parish, and with its appendages belonged at an early period to the family of De Burgh. Thomas De Burgh gave this lordship to the Earl of Lancaster in 1311: it is now in the possession of Lord Tolle-mache of Helmingham, with the

exception of such plots as belonged to the trustees of Tintwistle Chapel, the Earl of Stamford, T. H. Sidebottom, esq. M.P. and the Mayor and Corporation of Manchester. The principal landowners are Lord Tolle-mache and the Earl of Stamford and Warrington. The area is 14,120 acres, 2,458 of which are assessed at the rateable value of £8,630, the remainder being moorland or sheep walks; the rateable value of the parish is £31,000. Tintwistle and Micklehurst form one township for poor-rate purposes, and contained 2,715 persons in 1871; the population of the ecclesiastical parish is 3,295.

Arnfield is a small hamlet, half a mile to the north of Tintwistle.

MICKLEHURST is noticed in alphabetical order.

Woodhead (or LONGDENALE) is a hilly district extending from 3 to 4 miles east from Tintwistle, and is an ecclesiastical parish formed in 1856 from the mother parish of Mottram-in-Longdendale. Here are the extensive reservoirs of the Manchester Corporation Water Works, which are on a gigantic scale, with capacities and areas as follows:—The Woodhead reservoir, 1,235,000,000 gallons and area 135 acres; Torside, 1,474,000,000 gallons, and 160 acres; Rhodes Wood, 500,000,000 gallons, and 54 acres; Arnfield, 209,000,000 gallons, and 39 acres; Hollingworth, 73,000,000 gallons, and 13 acres, giving a collective area of the reservoirs situated in the Vale of Longdendale of 401 acres, and a united capacity of 3,491,000,000 gallons. The Manchester, Sheffield, and Lincolnshire railway passes the moors by a tunnel three miles long; the nearest stations are at Crowden and Dunford Bridge. The church of St. James, erected in the fifteenth century, under the will of Sir Edmund Shaw, Lord Mayor of London, is a small plain building, put into repair some years ago by the farmers of the district. The living is a perpetual curacy, in the gift of Lord Tolle-mache of Helmingham, yearly value £90, and held by the Rev. John Chambers, M.A. of St. John's College, Cambridge. The principal landowners are Lord Tolle-mache, of Helmingham, and the Earl of Stamford and Warrington. The area is 11,340 acres; the population in 1871 was 314.
