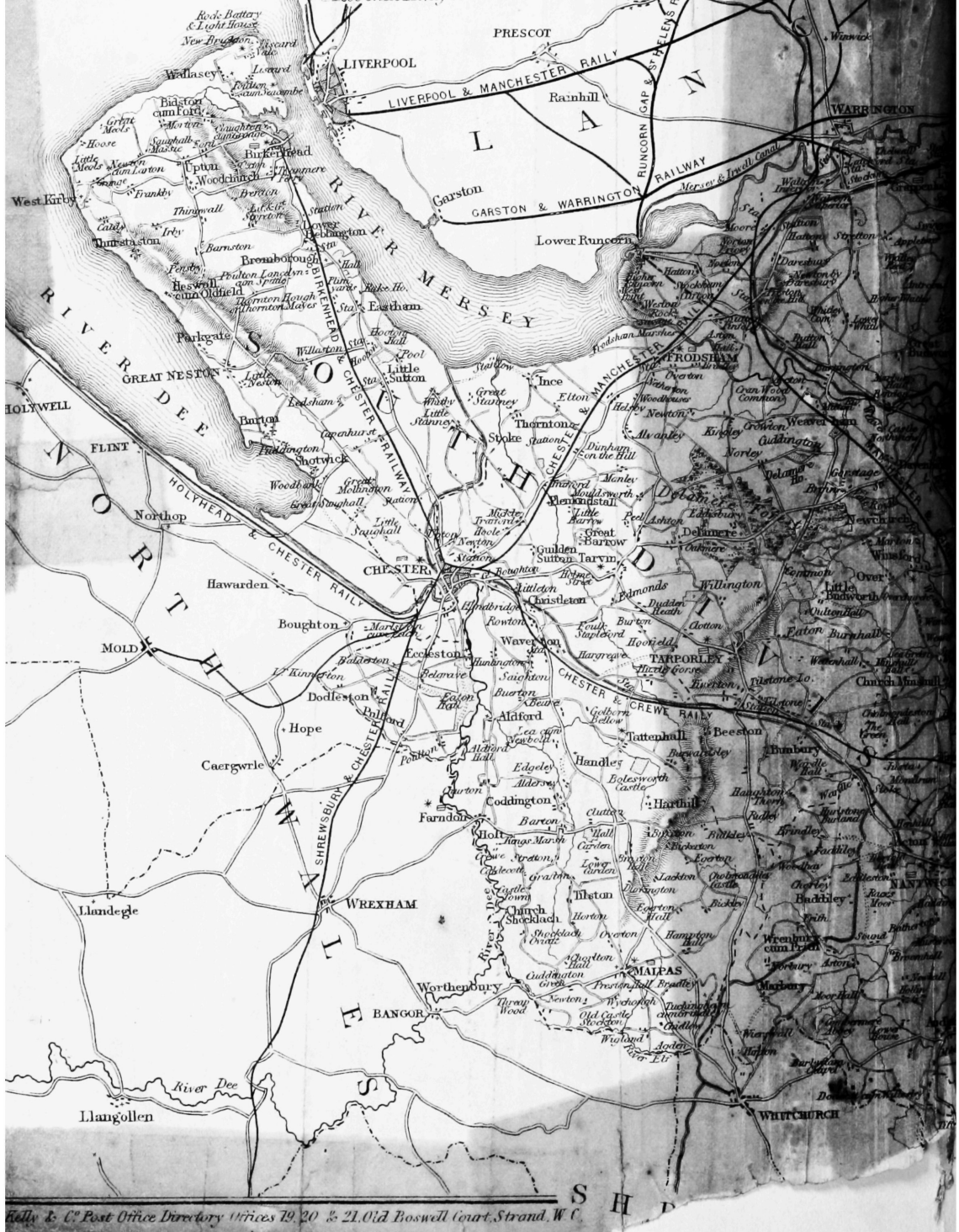

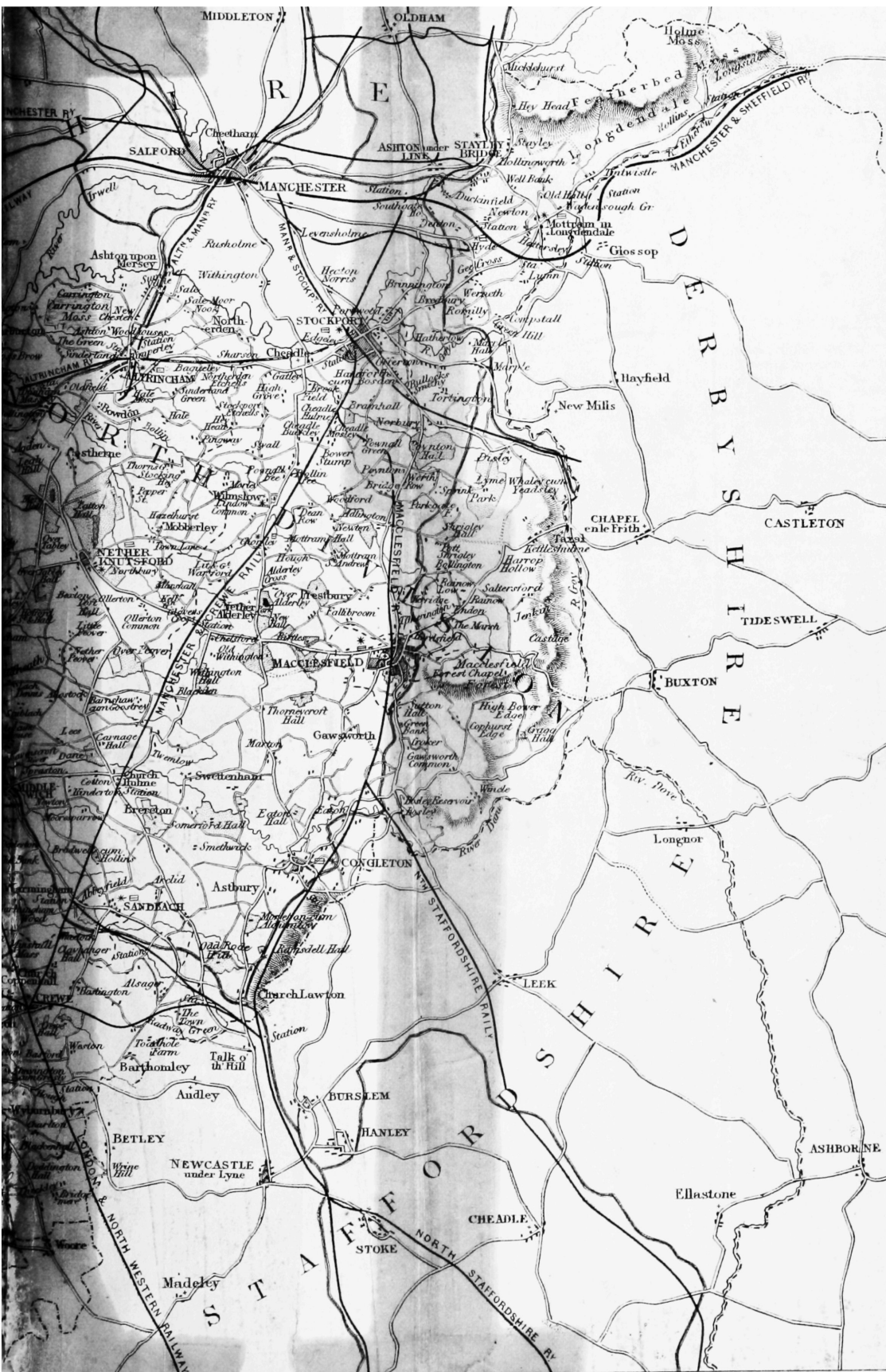

ALDFORD is a parish, comprising the townships of ALDFORD and CHURTON, and CHURTON HEATH, or BRUERA, BUERTON, and EDGERLEY. The township of Aldford is 6 miles south from Chester and 8 from Malpas, in the hundred of Broxton, and deanery, archdeaconry, and bishopric of Chester, South Cheshire, situated on the river Dee. The church of St. John the Baptist, a very ancient building, partly in the Gothic style, has a nave, chancel, square tower and spire, 3 bells, an organ, old stone font, gallery, one stained glass window, and clock. The living is a rectory, worth £320 yearly, with residence, in the gift of the Marquis of Westminster; the Rev. Lockhart William Jeffray, M.A., is the incumbent. There is a chapel for Methodists. There is a Free school for 80 boys and 60 girls, supported by the Marquis and Marchioness of Westminster. The soil is heavy and agricultural. The late

Marquis of Westminster had an iron bridge erected over the river Dee, at a cost of nearly £9,000. The population of the township, in 1851, was 520, and the acreage is 1,273. The Marquis of Westminster is lord of the manor. The chief crops are wheat and hay. There are small charities, which are distributed to the poor of the parish on St. Stephen's day. Eaton Hall, the seat of the Marquis of Westminster, is half a mile north-west. Aldford was a Roman settlement.

BUERTON is a township, with 63 inhabitants and 668 acres.

CHURTON-BY-ALDFORD is a township, 2 miles south-west, with 251 inhabitants and an area of 572 acres.

EDGERLEY is a township, 2 miles south, with 120 acres, and in 1851 the population was 10; in 1841 the population was 12. There is now one farm.

ALTRINCHAM, or, as it is frequently written, ALTRINCHAM, is 30 miles north-east from Chester, 7 south from Knutsford, 8 south-south-west from Manchester, 11 $\frac{1}{2}$ from Warrington, 31 $\frac{1}{2}$ from Bolton, 25 from Liverpool, and 193 $\frac{1}{2}$ from London, is a market, union, and railway town, at which there are two stations not far apart, the one at the southern extremity being principally for the accommodation of the inhabitants of Bowdon and Dunham, and is termed the Bowdon Downs station. The town has streets well paved and lighted with gas. It is a township and chapelry in the parish of Bowdon and hundred of Bucklow. The soil of the country round is well adapted for the growth of fruit and vegetables, particularly carrots and onions; the former have acquired a universal celebrity, and are known as the Altringham or green-top carrot; onions are also grown here to a great extent. The chapel of ease is a plain brick building, erected in 1799 by subscription, and is situated in an obscure locality at the back of the houses in Church-street. The living is a perpetual curacy, value £150 per annum, in the patronage of the vicar of Bowdon for the time being, and held by the Rev. John Blake Honnyville, B.A. The Bridge-water canal skirts the township for three-quarters of a mile at the northern entrance of the town called Broadheath, where there are extensive warehouses and coal wharfs, also a timber yard, steam-sawing and bone-grinding mills, on a large scale, in the occupation of the Messrs. Johnsons. The station on the Warrington and Stockport line is situated here. The Town-hall, near the Market-place, is a handsome red brick building, with stone dressings, erected by the munificence of the Earl of Stamford and Warrington in 1849; the lower portion is used for the sale of butter, poultry, eggs, &c.; above that, extending the whole length of the building, is a noble room, used occasionally for public meetings, balls, lectures, &c.; the front is ornamented by bell turret and clock, surmounted by a cupola and gilt vane; the magistrates have an apartment here, in which they hold a petty session every Tuesday, which is the market day. The Wesleyans, Congregationalists, Unitarians, New Connexion Methodists, and Roman Catholics, have each a chapel here. The Altringham and Bowdon Literary Institution is a handsome brick building, in the Elizabethan style of architecture, and was erected in 1852, at a cost of £800, raised by subscription. The neighbourhood contains many handsome detached villa residences, principally occupied by Manchester merchants. The Hospital, a brick building, situated at the extreme point of Lloyd-street, on the moss apart from the town, was erected in commemoration of the late much-

esteemed Jeremiah Lloyd, Esq., of Oldfield Hall, at a cost of £600, upon land given for that purpose by the present noble owner of Dunham Massey Hall; it is now supported by voluntary contributions; the land and building are vested in twelve trustees, who when reduced to five in number by death, being desirous of being discharged, or becoming incapable to act, are to be again increased to twelve by the appointment of the survivors. The population of the township, in 1851, was 4,488, with 657 acres.

ASHLEY, 2 miles from Altringham, is a township and scattered village, in Bowdon parish, Altringham union, pleasantly situated in an open country, consisting principally of farm houses. The Hall, the ancient seat of the Asshetons, originally a fine old mansion, a large portion of which was taken down about 1855, is now converted into a farm dwelling, and is in the occupation of Mr. Thomas Whittingham; the floors of the principal rooms and staircase are of solid oak, in good preservation; two of the upper rooms contain ancient portraits of noblemen and gentlemen; that of Thomas Assheton, of Ashley, the then proprietor of the hall, has been removed by one of his survivors: the originals of the portraits assembled here during the rebellion of the Pretender, when the expediency of joining his standard was debated, and the resolution came to was given by the casting vote of the chairman, Thomas Assheton, Esq., owner of the mansion, in favour of the reigning sovereign. This circumstance, from the powerful influence and family connexions of the parties, must have greatly affected the cause of the Pretender in that district. The portraits are all full length, each bears the date 1720, and are supposed to be exact likenesses, but by whom executed is not known. The breakfast room still remains in its original state, the ceiling of which is very handsome; the gardens are kept in excellent order by the present occupier. Wilbraham Egerton, Esq., is owner of the property and lord of the manor. The mill, an ancient structure within a short distance of the hall, worked by an overshot wheel, is situated on the river Bollin, just above which is the dam head, forming a pretty cascade. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats, and beans; the soil is a stiff clay. The principal landed proprietors, in addition to W. Egerton, Esq., are William Dodge Cooper Cooper, Esq., John Orrell, Esq., Mr. Thomas Dooley, and Mr. William Royle. The population, in 1851, was 379, and the area 2,173 acres. The Wesleyan Methodists have a neat brick-built chapel situated at Hough Green.

The Society of Friends have a neat chapel of red brick, erected in 1856, with a wall enclosing about one acre of ground, which is used as a cemetery. ASTBURY, or **NEWBOLD ASTBURY**, is a township, agreeable village, and extensive parish, in the southern division of the county of Chester, Northwich hundred, Congleton union, and deanery, archdeaconry, and diocese of Chester, South Cheshire. The village is pleasantly situated 1½ miles south-west from Congleton. The parish church of St. Mary is an old structure of stone, and is considered one of the handsomest in the shire; it is in the Gothic style of architecture, consisting of nave and chancel, north and south aisles, with a tower at the north-west angle containing 4 bells and a clock, and surmounted by a spire. The interior is well paved, has a gallery, on which is erected a powerful organ, and contains a curious old font. The nave is separated from the aisles by massive clustered pillars, beautifully arched, and the chancel by an elegant carved screen. The roof is of oak. There are several interesting memorials in the sacred edifice. The living is a rectory, worth £2,000 yearly, with residence. The Rev. Offley Crewe, M.A., is the rector, and the Rev. Conway Joyce, B.A., is curate. The Rectory is a large and handsome building of red brick. There is a National school, built in 1852, for boys and girls, supported by subscription and the children's pence; the average attendance is about 100. The parish of Astbury comprises the chapelrys of Buglawton and Congleton. The population of the entire parish, in 1851, was 18,000, and the acreage, 19,602. The population of Newbold Astbury, in 1851, was 705,

and the acreage is 2,730. Bricks and tiles are made here. Brownlow and Wall Hill are places in this township.

The following are townships in the parish of Astbury:—
DAVENPORT township is 4½ miles north from Astbury and ½ north-west from Congleton (its post town). It is in Northwich hundred and Congleton union. Davenport Hall (a brick building) is the seat of Mrs. Tipping. The population, in 1851, was 129, and there are 755 acres of land. Lady Wilmot is lady of the manor and owner of the township.

HULME WALFIELD township is 4 miles from Astbury and 1½ from Congleton. The church (opened October, 1856) is a very handsome and substantial stone building, built on an elevated spot, commanding extensive views of Mow Cop, Cloud End, and the Derbyshire hills. The living is a perpetual curacy, in the gift of the Rev. Offley Crewe, M.A., the rector of Astbury; the Rev. T. P. White is incumbent. The church will accommodate 300 persons, and consists of nave, chancel, north aisle, handsome font, and an organ. In 1851 a handsome National school was erected, with residence for master and mistress. There are 128 on the books, and there is a Sunday school. The population, in 1851, was 131, and there are 1,047 acres of land. The soil is clay and sand. A. H. Davenport, Esq., and the Misses Varden are the chief landowners.

BOWDON is a township and parish, with the chapelries of ALTRINCHAM and CARRINGTON; it is 9 miles from Manchester and 1 from Altrincham, on the Manchester South Junction and Altrincham line of railway, in the hundred of Bucklow, Altrincham union, East Frodsham deanery, Chester archdeaconry, North Cheshire, situated on the river Bollin, and is now a large town which stands on a commanding eminence; its delightful situation, and the facilities presented by the railway, have been the cause of its environs being studded with villas and mansions. The soil is a fine rich light loam. The wealthy classes of Manchester are the chief residents. The church, dedicated to the Blessed Virgin Mary, is very old; it is seated on a considerable elevation; it is in the corrupted Perpendicular style of architecture, with an embattled tower, 6 bells, and a porch. The interior consists of a nave, chancel, and aisles, terminating in two private chapels appropriated to the Earl of Stamford's manors of Dunham Massey and Carrington; in the church are several handsome marble monuments and tablets, principally to the Booths, Langhams, and Asshetons—members of the Stamford and Warrington family,—also one erected by the inhabitants of this neighbourhood to the memory of Edward Jeremiah Lloyd, of Oldfield Hall, who died on the 3rd of July, 1850, in the 61st year of his age. It is intended to rebuild the church immediately. The living is a vicarage, the tithes for which are commuted at £401 per annum; the fees amount to about £80, with residence and 51 acres of glebe land, in the presentation of the Bishop of Chester, and held by the Rev. William Pollock, M.A., vicar; the Rev. Charles Brittan, M.A., is the curate. A handsome and spacious chapel, in the Early English style of architecture, for the Wesleyan Methodists, was opened for divine service on the 25th of March, 1857. Here are schools for boys, girls, and infants, founded in the 17th century by a Mr. Edward Vawdrey, who bequeathed £4 per annum to it; the school-house is a plain but commodious building, rebuilt at the expense of the parish in 1806. The charities are very numerous, several benefactors having left, by will, bread to be given away to the poor every Sunday for ever; clothing is also distributed occasionally; the recipients are included in the several townships in the parish. The Vicarage is a handsome residence, pleasantly situated about a mile from the parish church, on the banks of the river Bollin. The population of the township, in 1851, was 1,164, and the acreage 828. The soil is light sand or peat. The Earl of Stamford and Warrington is lord of the manor and chief landowner.

CARRINGTON, 8½ miles from Manchester, 11 from Warrington, and 5 from Altrincham, is a township and chapelry in the parish of Bowdon, and hundred of Bucklow. The chapel of ease is a neat brick building, with a turret and 1 bell; the interior contains a nave and one aisle. The living is a perpetual curacy, in the gift of the Earl of Stamford and Warrington; the Rev. George Heron, M.A., is the incumbent, and the Rev. Thomas Fauvel, B.A., is the curate. Nearly adjoining the chapel is the school, a remarkably handsome modern building of red brick, in the Elizabethan style of architecture; it is endowed, and the boys and girls

are instructed upon the National system. There is also a Sunday school held in the building. Here is a large barren tract of land called Carrington Moss, which is being gradually brought into a state of cultivation. The ancient hall was taken down about 1856, and replaced by a handsome farm residence, with suitable outbuildings, which is in the occupation of Mr. W. Walkden. The river Mersey runs past here, and divides this shire from Lancashire; on its banks sluices are placed at convenient distances, by means of which the low meadow lands adjoining can be irrigated at pleasure. The Earl of Stamford and Warrington is lord of the manor and chief landowner. The Wesleyans and Primitive Methodists have each a chapel here. The population, in 1851, was 536, and the area 2,333 acres.

HALE BARNS, 2 miles from Altrincham, 7½ from Knutsford, and 10 from Manchester, is a township in the parish of Bowdon, Altrincham union, Bucklow hundred, North Cheshire, consisting principally of scattered farm-houses, which are numerous here. The population, in 1851, was 995, and the acreage 3,679; 34 acres of which are comprised in Hale Moss, adjoining to Altrincham. The Earl of Stamford and Warrington is chief landowner and lord of the manor. The soil generally is a stiff clay.

PARTINGTON, 11 miles from Manchester, 4 from Altrincham, and 9 from Warrington, is a township in the parish of Bowdon, hundred of Bucklow, and Altrincham union. The village, a scattered one, consists principally of farm-houses; it is separated from Lancashire by the river Mersey. On its banks is an extensive paper-mill. The population, in 1851, was 485, and the acreage 803, belonging chiefly to the Earl of Stamford and Warrington, who is lord of the manor. The soil for the most part is peat, and the product wheat, barley, oats, hay, and potatoes. The Wesleyans, Independents, and Primitive Methodists, have each a chapel here.

RINGWAY, 3½ miles from Altrincham, 8 from Stockport, and 12 from Manchester, is a township and chapel of ease, in the parish of Bowdon. All Saints' chapel is a neat brick building; the Rev. John Massey is the incumbent, who resides at the Parsonage, adjoining which is a Sunday school for boys and girls under his superintendence. Farming is the principal occupation here.

SINDERLAND, about 1¼ miles from Dunham Massey, on the north side of the township, consists of several scattered farm-houses. The soil is remarkably light and sandy, admirably adapted for market gardening purposes, which is carried on here to a great extent, spade husbandry being principally resorted to for the cultivation of the land, in which the females take an active part. It is in Bowdon parish, Bucklow hundred, Altrincham union, North Cheshire.

WOODHOUSES, or DUNHAM WOODHOUSE, is a hamlet, pleasantly situated on the west side of the township. The houses present a remarkably neat appearance. Dunham station, on the Warrington and Stockport line of railway, is within a very short distance. The Primitive Methodists and Baptists have each a chapel here. This hamlet is in Dunham Massey township, Bowdon parish, Bucklow hundred, and Altrincham union, North Cheshire.

BRAMHALL, or **BRAMALL**, is a considerable township in the parish of Stockport. The soil is mostly stiff clay, with about one-third under the plough. Bramhall Hall, the seat of Lieut.-Col. Davenport, is a fine old mansion of timber and plaster, painted black and white, and is picturesquely situated on the knoll of a hill, at the foot of which runs a small rivulet. This is one of the most remarkable mansions in England, and many parts of the interior are very ancient. The Macclesfield branch of the London and North Western railway intersects the township, and has a

station at **POWNALL GREEN**. The population, in 1851, was 1,508, and the acreage 3,250.

HAZEL GROVE, formerly called **BULLOCK SMITHY**, is a populous hamlet of Bramhall, 2 miles south of Stockport, in the several townships of Bramhall, Norbury, Bosden, and Torkington; it is nearly 1 mile in length, and is principally situated in Bramhall and Bosden. The Wesleyans and Independents have chapels here. Here is a cotton factory and a mill for silk throwing.

BRERETON-cum-SMETHWICK is a township, parish, and scattered village, 3 miles north-east from Sandbach, in the Nantwich hundred, Congleton union, archdeaconry and bishopric of Chester, and parliamentary borough of South Cheshire. The church of St. Oswald is a handsome stone building in the later English style, with a tower containing 5 bells; it has a nave, two aisles, chancel, and font; the roof is of handsomely carved oak, and there is an elaborate mural monument to the memory of William Smethwick, Esq. The living is a rectory, annual value £681; the Rev. Edward Royds, M.A., is the incumbent. There are chapels for Wesleyans, Wesleyan New Con-

nexion, and Independents, and there is a school for boys and girls. Brereton Hall, the seat of Aaron Howard, Esq., is a handsome brick building with turrets, and is pleasantly situated. DUNHAM MASSEY, 3 miles west-west-by-south from Altrincham, and about $2\frac{1}{2}$ from the station at Bowdon on the Manchester South Junction and Altrincham line of railway, is a township in the parish of Bowdon, Bucklow hundred, Altrincham union, North Cheshire. The Hall, a handsome brick structure in the quadrangular form, is the occasional residence of the Earl of Stamford and Warrington; it was rebuilt in 1730, and contains some good family and other paintings by the old masters; it is situated in a park of many hundred acres of land and adorned with several fine sheets of water; a herd of about 500 deer is kept here. The church of St. Margaret, consecrated on the 13th day of June, 1855, situated on the turnpike road leading from Altrincham to Knutsford, was built from the designs of Mr. William Hayley, architect, of Manchester, at the sole expense of the Earl of Stamford and Warring-

ton; estimated to cost twenty thousand pounds; it is in the Perpendicular English style; it has a noble embattled tower and pinnacles, with a ribbed spire and enriched flying buttresses, rising to an altitude of 210 feet, surmounted by a gilt cross, and may be seen from a considerable distance; the tower contains a peal of 10 bells, the largest bearing the following inscription—

“As queen of queens, Victoria reigns:
 I sit as queen o'er Music's strains.
 And may her subjects loyal be
 As mine!—we dwell in harmony.”

The weight of this bell is 27 cwt. 3 qrs., the whole peal weighs 6 tons 3 cwt. 2 qrs. 10 lbs.: a set of 14 bells for chimes has been cast, thus making nine tons of bell-metal in the tower: for their weight the peal is considered to be the

finest in the country: they are the production of Messrs. Taylor and Son, of Loughborough; the exterior of the church is of wallstone, from the neighbourhood of Sheffield, with Ashlar stone dressings, from Hollington: the interior is also Hollington stone, and consists of lofty nave (lighted by clerestory windows), north and south aisles, transepts, and chancel: on the south side is the Stamford chapel, entered by a private door and lighted by two windows of two lights each, the ceiling has a richly worked pendant attached to the roof, and is enclosed on two sides by oak screens of beautiful design; the east window, of seven lights, is the Decorated English, and points to the reign of Edward III., 1377, with embattled transoms and mullions, the tracery of which is very rich: it is 30 feet by 14, and is filled with stained glass by Willemont, of London, and contains beautifully executed representations in the upper division of Our Saviour: in the centre, St. John the Baptist, St. Matthew, St. Mark, St. Luke, St. John the Evangelist, and St. Peter: lower division, St. Paul in the centre, Moses, David, Isaiah, Jeremiah, Daniel, and Malachi; the principal entrance is under the west window, which is of five lights filled in with tracery, and is of stained glass: the other entrance is through a porch on the south side: the pulpit, reading desk, reredos, and font, are all of Caen stone exquisitely carved, more particularly the reredos, which is divided into seven parts, answering to the seven-light window above, each part is an enriched canopy, and three of the centre compartments project from and rise above the others, and are supported by richly traceried buttresses with crockets and finials, the whole being surmounted by an enriched cornice and Tudor flower battlement: at each end is a niche with a very rich canopy, crocketed pinnacles and finials; in these niches are very finely executed carved figures, representing angels, on pedestals; the organ, built by Hill and Co., of London, is placed in the north transept, and is a powerful and fine-toned instrument: the case, a very handsome one, is of

carved oak, and so arranged as to admit of the whole of the window in that transept being seen; the church is lighted with gas from standards of a novel and beautiful design, arranged on each side of the nave, in advance of the piers; the chancel contains two standards of larger proportions and still richer design—the shafts have interlacing fretwork, picked out with gold and blue, branches are entwined with leaves, representing the Passiflora, of bright gilt metal, the buds are formed of crystals; the lighting throughout is perfect and in accordance with the style of the church: Messrs. Skidmore and Son, of Coventry, were the designers and manufacturers of the gas standards; the altar is covered with rich crimson velvet and fringe of gold coloured silk, in front is the sacred monogram most beautifully embroidered; the roof of the nave is of oak, open framed, with curved ribs and hammer beams, at the ends of which are richly executed figures, representing angels with expanded wings: the seats are of the same material, with open ends, and each contains a stuffed leather cushion extending the whole length of them: the ceiling of the chancel, which perfectly accords with the style, is divided into panels, having a large boss in the centre compartment: the altar floor is of encaustic tiles of beautiful pattern: the nave, aisles, and chancel, are of polished stone and black marble dots. The living is a perpetual curacy, value £80 yearly, in the gift of the Earl of Stamford and Warrington, the Rev. John Kingsley, M.A., is surrogate and incumbent. The new day schools, just completed, are on a site of land valued at £350, given by the Earl of Stamford. The cost of the building was £1,500, of which the Committee of Council on Education gave a grant of £756; the remainder was raised by voluntary contributions. The schools will hold 300 boys and girls. Here is a school for infants. The Earl of Stamford and Warrington is lord of the manor and chief landowner.

EASTHAM is a township, parish, and village, $1\frac{1}{2}$ miles south from Bromborough, $1\frac{1}{2}$ north from Hooton station on the Birkenhead, Lancashire, and Cheshire Junction railway, $\frac{1}{4}$ south from Eastham Ferry on the river Mersey, 9 north from Chester, and 6 south from Birkenhead, in the eastern division of the hundred and in the union of Wirral, south division of the county, deanery of Wyrehall or Worrall, archdeaconry of Liverpool, and diocese of Chester. The parish contains the townships of EASTHAM, HOOTON, NETHER and OVER POOL, GREAT and LITTLE SUTTON, CHILDER-THORNTON, and part of WHITBY. It is situated on the river Mersey, intersected by the Ellesmere canal, and on the high road from Chester to Birkenhead. The church of St. Mary is an ancient structure in the Gothic style, has a spire, tower, nave, aisles, porch, chancel, 5 bells, several monuments, a font 700 years old, clock, old register, and chest. The living is a vicarage worth £290 yearly, with residence and 13 acres of glebe land, in the gift of the Dean and Chapter of Chester; the Rev. Thomas Eaton, M.A., is the incumbent, and the Rev. Joseph Greene Bourne, M.A., is the curate. There is a National school for boys and girls, and a Sunday school is held at Eastham. The population, in 1851, was 418, and the acreage is 2,036.

CHILDER-THORNTON, or THORNTON-CHILDER, is a township and small village in the parish of Eastham,

south division of the county, eastern division of the hundred of Wirral, and in the union of the same name; it is 1 mile distant from each of the Sutton and the Hooton stations of the Birkenhead, Lancashire, and Cheshire Junction railway, 8 north-north-west from Chester, 7 south from Birkenhead, and 5 east from Great Neston. The chief landowners are Rob Morris, William Hope, and Richard Naylor, Esqrs. Here is an Infant school. The population, in 1851, was 319; acres, 723.

NETHER POOL (near Chester), 3 miles east from Sutton railway station, 9 north-east from Chester, and 8 south from Birkenhead, is a township in the parish of Eastham, eastern division of the hundred of Wirral, and in the union of same name, southern division of the county. The population, in 1851, was 23; acreage, 1,680. Pool Hall, a fine old structure in the Tudor style, is a stone mansion, with projecting gables; it was long the residence of the Pool family, but is now the residence of Mr. William Amery, farmer; it is situate on the southern shore of the River Mersey, and about $2\frac{1}{2}$ miles north from the Sutton station of the Birkenhead, Lancashire, and Cheshire Junction railway.

OVER POOL (near Chester), situate 2 miles east from the railway station at Sutton, 8 north-west from Chester, and 7 south from Birkenhead, is a township in the parish of Eastham,

TIMPERLEY, 8 miles south from Manchester, 8½ north-north-east from Knutsford, 1½ north from Altrincham, and 1 west from the railway station on the Manchester, South Junction and Altrincham line of railway, is a township, ecclesiastical district, and very increasing village, in the east division of Bucklow hundred, Altrincham union, East Frodsham deanery, Chester archdeaconry, and bishopric of Chester, North Cheshire, situated on the old road from Altrincham to Stockport. The Bridge-water canal runs through a part of the township in a line parallel to the railway. Christ Church is a modern stone building in the mixed style of architecture; was consecrated and opened for divine service September 27th, 1849; is erected on a rather elevated site, bequeathed by the late John Barratt, Esq.; it has a porch, tower, and spire, which is seen from a considerable distance. The interior consists of a nave, side aisles, transepts, and chancel, the latter containing a painted window, by Wailes, of Newcastle; in the body is a good-toned organ. The living is a perpetual curacy, value £200 yearly, with residence, in the gift of trustees. The Rev. Edward Dowling, M.A., is the incumbent. Here is a National school for girls and infants, also an Endowed school for boys; the Sunday school is held at the former school-room, which is a handsome and commodious white

brick building, capable of accommodating 200 children, and was erected in 1855. The Wesleyan Methodists have a chapel here, built in 1846. Here is a stone quarry; the stone being of a soft porous nature, is principally used in the construction of walls. Riddings Hall is an ancient farmhouse, approached through an arch of stone, and surrounded by a moat; a great portion of the house has been modernised. Fir Tree Farm presents a still more antique appearance, being of timber and plaster, with projecting gables, and has the date 1676 over the door. The neighbourhood abounds now with villa residences, principally occupied by the merchants of Manchester. Pickering Lodge, a handsome seat, surrounded by extensive grounds, tastefully and ornamentally laid out, is the property and residence of John Skelton, Esq. The population, in 1851, was 1,008; and the acreage is 1,628, statute measure. A part of the townships of Baguley and Hale are included in the ecclesiastical district assigned to the church, which has become a distinct parish under Lord Blandford's Act. Samuel Brooks, Benjamin Bagnall, and John Skelton, Esqrs., are chief landowners. The soil is clayey in general; and the subsoil marl. The chief crops are wheat and oats. Gardening is also carried on to a great extent. There are charities of about £20 yearly value.

TINTWISTLE, with the Hamlets of ARNFIELD, MICKLEHURST, and WOODHEAD, or LONGENDALE.

The township and ecclesiastical parish of TINTWISTLE—spelt in old records TINGETWISSEL—covers an area of 14,120 acres, 2,494 of which are assessed at the rateable value of £7,552, the remainder being used for moorland or sheep walks; it is divided into four hamlets—TINTWISTLE, MICKLEHURST, ARNFIELD, and WOODHEAD, the united population of which, according to the last census, was 3,027. In the twelfth century Tintwistle was part of the manorial estate of the De Burghs; but is now in the possession of John Tollemache, Esq., M.P., of Peckforton Castle, with the exception of such plots as belong to the trustees of Tintwistle Chapel, the Earl of Stamford, the Messrs. Sidebottom, and the Mayor and Corporation of Manchester. The village of Tintwistle, distant 13 miles from Manchester, 2½ miles from Mottram, and 1 mile from Hadfield station on the Sheffield and Manchester railway, is pleasantly "set on a hill," at the foot of which runs the Etherow, and commands a fine view of a great part of Longendale and of the Derbyshire Peak. The houses are built of stone, obtained from the neighbouring quarries, and are admirably adapted by their structure for resisting the strong winds and heavy rains to which the vicinity is sometimes exposed. The village is well supplied with water, which has been brought from the moor behind it at the sole expense of the inhabitants, and is lighted up with gas. From its proximity to the railway and the coal fields of Yorkshire, Derbyshire, Cheshire, and Lancashire, also from the rapid increase of cotton factories, Tintwistle will, in all probability, ere long become thickly peopled. The church is a modern Gothic structure, with a lofty tower and pinnacles, and will accommodate 1,000 worshippers. The living is a perpetual curacy, vested in trustees; the Rev. James Augustus Page, B.A., is the incumbent. Near the church are National schools, built in 1840. The Independents have had a congregation in this village for nearly 200 years. Their present minister is the Rev. Robert George Milne, M.A. Their chapel will comfortably seat 800 individuals; attached to it is a burial-place and the chapel parsonage; and in the middle of the village there stands the school known throughout the district as the Tintwistle Sunday School. The building, with its classrooms, committee-rooms, and libraries, is a noble instance

of the achievements of voluntary effort. In 1853 the jubilee of the school was commemorated, when the sum of £300 was raised for its enlargement. The lower part of the edifice is occupied during the week as a British school, under the management of Mr. R. Marshall; it numbers 200 scholars, is under Government inspection, and enjoys a small endowment, left by John Rhodes, for the education of six poor children. Occupying the same premises, with the leave of the trustees, is the Tintwistle Mechanics' Institute, which has at present 100 members enrolled on its list, and has a well selected library; also the Tintwistle Benevolent Club, "the aim of which," as it is set forth in its rules, "is to ensure the general objects of sick and friendly clubs, and at the same time to obviate the conscientious objections of many moral and religious persons to existing societies;" to carry out this purpose, it is enjoined that "in no case and under no pretence shall its meetings be held at any alehouse or tavern, or its monies be wasted on ale or spirits." This provident society, instituted in 1831, though under the presidency of the minister of Tintwistle chapel, is open to the members of all denominations. At present it has 90 members, and commands a permanent fund of nearly £800. The Wesleyans worship in Ebenezer Chapel, which can accommodate 250 individuals; it is supplied by ministers from the Glossop circuit. Connected with it there is a Young Men's Institute. Tintwistle is in Macclesfield hundred and deanery, Ashton union, Chester archdeaconry and bishopric, and York archbishopric, North Cheshire.

ARNFIELD is a small hamlet, half a mile to the north of Tintwistle.

MICKLEHURST is a large village, 3 miles north-east from Stalybridge, and 5 north from Tintwistle; there are several large cotton mills in the immediate neighbourhood, on which its population is dependent. Near here is the site of Buckton Castle, once a strong fortress, seated at a great elevation, commanding the adjacent country.

WOODHEAD, or LONGENDALE, is a hilly district, extending from 3 to 4 miles east from Tintwistle. Here are several of the extensive reservoirs of the Manchester Corporation Waterworks; the works are on a gigantic scale, and have altogether a capacity for nearly six hundred millions of cubic feet of water. The chapel is a plain old building, erected, in the fifteenth century, under the will of Sir Edmund Shaw, Lord Mayor of London.
