ALDFORD is a parish, comprising the townships of Aldford and Churton, and Churton Heath, or Bruera, Buerton, and Edgerley. The township of Aldford is 6 miles south from Chester, and 8 from Malpas, in the higher division of the hundred of Broxton, union of Great Boughton, county court district of Chester, rural deanery of Malpas, archdeaconry and diocese of Chester, South Cheshire, and is situated on the river Dee. The church of St. John the Baptist, a very ancient building, partly Gothic, has nave, chancel, square tower and spire, 3 bells, organ, old stone font, gallery, one stained glass window, and clock. The living is a rectory, annual value £320, with residence, in the gift of the Marquis of Westminster; the Rev. Charles Michael Turner, B.A., of Caius College, Cambridge, is the incumbent. There is a chapel for Methodists. There is a Free school for 80 boys and 60 girls, supported by the Marquis and Marchioness of Westminster. The soil is heavy and agricultural. The late Marquis of Westminster had an iron bridge erected over the river Dee, at a cost of nearly

£9,000. The population of the township in 1861 was 438, and the acreage is 1,273. The Marquis of Westminster is lord of the manor. The chief crops are wheat and hay. There are small charities, which are distributed to the poor of the parish on St. Stephen's Day. Eaton Hall, the seat of the Marquis of Westminster, is half a mile north-west. Aldford was a Roman settlement.

BUERTON is a township, with 68 inhabitants and 668 acres.

CHURTON-BY-ALDFORD is a township, 2 miles south-west, with 217 inhabitants and an area of 572 acres.

EDGERLEY is a township, 2 miles south, with 120 acres, and in 1861 the population was 8.

ALTRINCHAM.

ALTRINCHAM (or, as it is frequently written, **ALTRINGHAM**), 30 miles north-east from Chester, 7 south from Knutsford, 8 south-south-west from Manchester, 11½ from Warrington, 18½ from Bolton, 30 from Liverpool, and 193½ from London, is a market, union, railway town, and polling place for North Cheshire, and a township and chapelry in the parish of Bowdon, hundred of Bucklow, North Cheshire. The town is well built, and in the vicinity are some handsome villas: the situation is dry and very healthy, the streets clean and well lighted with gas, and there is a good supply of water from the North Cheshire Water Company. The Manchester South Junction and Altrincham Railway adds greatly to the convenience of the district: there are three stations; the Altrincham one, in the Stockport-road, joins the Cheshire Midland to Knutsford and Northwich; another, situated in Railway-street, at the southern extremity of the town, is termed the Bowdon station, being principally for the accommodation of the inhabitants of Bowdon and Dunham; and the Broadheath station at the northern extremity of the town on the London and North Western line to Warrington, Garston and Liverpool.

The market for butter and eggs is held on Tuesdays. Fairs are held on the 29th of April, 6th of August, and the 22nd of November.

The Altrincham union consists of the following townships:—Agden, Altrincham, Ashley, Ashton, Aston-by-Budworth, Baguley, Bexton, Bollin Fee, Bollington, Bowdon, Carrington, Dunham-Massey, Fulshaw, Hale, High Leigh, Knutsford Inferior, Knutsford Superior, Lymm, Marthall, Mere, Millington, Mobberley, Northen, Northen Etchells, Ollerton, Partington, Peover Inferior, Peover Superior, Pickmere, Plumley, Pownall Fee, Rostherne, Sale, Tabley Inferior, Tabley Superior, Tatton Timperley, Toft, and Warburton. The Union House is at Knutsford.

Lloyd's Hospital and Provident Dispensary is a brick building, erected in 1853 at the extreme point of Lloyd-street, in commemoration of the late much esteemed Edward Jeremiah Lloyd, Esq., of Oldfield Hall, at a cost of £600, raised by private subscription, Mrs. Lloyd contributing £300, upon land given for that purpose by the present noble owner of Dunham Massey Hall; Mrs. Lloyd also left a legacy of £1,000 to endow it; it is now supported by voluntary contributions; the land and building are vested in twelve trustees, who, when reduced to five in number by death, being desirous of being discharged, or becoming incapable to act, are to be again increased to twelve by appointment of the survivors.

The Altrincham and Bowdon Literary Institution is a handsome brick building, in the Elizabethan style of architecture, erected on a site given by the Earl of Stamford and Warrington in 1852, at a cost of £800, raised by subscription: the library contains nearly 1,800 volumes; in

connection with the institution are educational, botanical, horticultural, &c., classes. The building is now being considerably enlarged.

The local board of health meet monthly, on the first Friday, at their office, High-street.

The mayor is appointed annually at the Michaelmas court leet of the lord of the barony, a charter making it a free borough having been granted to Altrincham in the reign of Edward I., about the year 1290.

The Town Hall, near the Market-place, is a red brick building with stone dressings, erected by the munificence of the Earl of Stamford and Warrington in 1849; the lower portion is used for the sale of butter, poultry, eggs, &c.; above that, extending the whole length of the building, is a large assembly room, 66 feet by 30, used occasionally for public meetings, balls, lectures, &c.: the front is ornamented by a bell turret and clock (illuminated at night), surmounted by a cupola and gilt vane; a fire bell is now placed here in case of fire. £10 a year is paid for a room in which the magistrates hold the petty sessions once a fortnight, on Tuesdays.

A New Hall for holding the petty sessions, near the Towns Office, Dunham-road, will shortly be erected: it will be fitted up with every convenience for the bench, solicitors, the public, and the prisoners. Attached will be the retiring-room for the magistrates, &c.; underneath will be the police office and lock-ups, with residence for the sergeant on one side, and a parade-ground at the back for the men.

The county court is held at the Town Hall once a month, and comprises within its jurisdiction the following townships:—Agden, Altrincham, Ashley, Ashton-upon-Mersey, Baguley, Bexton, Bollin Fee, Bollington, Bowdon, Carrington, Dunham Massey, Fulshaw, Hale, High Leigh, Knutsford Inferior, Knutsford Superior, Marthall with Little Warford, Mere, Millington, Mobberley, Ollerton, Partington, Pownall Fee, Rostherne, Sale, Tabley Superior, Tatton, Timperley, Warburton, and Wilmslow.

St. George's church is a plain but commodious brick building, situated in Church-street: it was built in 1799 by subscription, and has been twice enlarged. The living is a perpetual curacy, annual value £360, in the patronage of the vicar of Bowdon for the time being, and held by the Rev. George London, of St. Aidan's College, Birkenhead; the Rev. Thomas Wade Powell, M.A., of St. John's College, Cambridge, is the curate. The parsonage house is near the church; also the National schools, for boys, girls, and infants.

Another church is about being erected in Ashley-road, at the south end of the town: the cost of the building will be met by public subscription; the land has been given by the Earl of Stamford and Warrington.

The British school, near the Ashley-road, is a neat structure, erected in 1860, at a cost of £2,400.

The Roman Catholic chapel of St. Vincent and St. Paul is a small structure in the Gothic style, erected in 1858: it will seat near 400 people; the Rev. Henry Alcock is the priest; there is also a day school in connection.

The New Connexion Methodist chapel is in George-street. The Wesleyan chapel, in Chapel-walk, was erected in 1787. A new one is being built in Bank-street, at a cost of £4,000, in the Byzantine style of architecture. The Congregational chapel, erected in 1848 on the Downs, will hold near 1,000. The Unitarians have a small chapel in Shaw-lane. There are Sunday schools in connection with these places of worship.

The Bridgewater Canal intersects the township for three-quarters of a mile at the northern entrance of the town, called Broadheath. The London and North Western Railway to Warrington, Garston and Liverpool passes through here, and has a station. Here are extensive warehouses and coal wharfs; also the timber yard, steam sawing and bone grinding mills on a large scale, in the occupation of the Messrs. Johnson, and the iron foundry of Messrs. Wood and Co.

The soil of the country round is well adapted for the growth of fruit and vegetables, particularly carrots and onions; the former have acquired a universal celebrity, and are known as the Altrincham, or green-top, carrot.

An agricultural and horticultural show is held annually. Baths and washhouses are about being erected on Hale Moss. The public slaughterhouses are on the outskirts of the town.

The neighbourhood contains many handsome detached villa residences, principally occupied by Manchester merchants.

Oldfield Hall, a quarter of a mile north-west, the property and residence of John Allen, Esq., is a handsome stone building, situated in a park of several acres.

The population of the township in 1861 was 6,628; the acreage is 657; the rateable value is £23,333 6s. 11d., and the gross value £27,636 12s. 5d. The Earl of Stamford and Warrington is lord of the manor and principal landowner. There are various charities for the poor.

principal rooms and staircase are of oak, in good preservation; two of the upper rooms formerly contained ancient portraits of noblemen and gentlemen—that of Thomas Assheton, of Ashley, the then proprietor of the Hall, Sir Ralph Grosvenor, of Eaton, Henry Legh, Esq., of High Legh, Amos Meredith, of Henbury, Earl of Barrymore, John Warren, Esq., of Poynton, Robert Cholmondley, of Holfot, Peter Leigh, of Lyme, Charles Hurlson, of Newton, Alexander Radcliffe, of Loe Denton, and Edward Berresford, Esq.—but they have been removed by the present proprietor, Lord Egerton, of Tatton, to Tatton Hall: the originals of the portraits assembled here during the rebellion of the Pretender, when the expediency of joining his standard was debated, and the resolution come to was given by the casting vote of the chairman, Thomas Assheton, Esq., owner of the mansion, in favour of the reigning sovereign: this circumstance, from the powerful influence and family connections of the parties, must have greatly affected the cause of the Pretender in that district: the portraits are all full-length, each bears the date 1720, and are supposed to be exact likenesses, but by whom executed is not known. The breakfast room still remains in its original state, the ceiling of which is very handsome: the gardens are kept in excellent order by the present occupier. A school church was erected in 1864 at Hough Green, at the sole expense of Lord Egerton of Tatton: it is in the Gothic style of architecture; the Rev. William Mills, M.A., of Queen's College, Cambridge, is the curate. Near the railway station is a neat parsonage house for the minister. The Wesleyan Methodists have a neat brick-built chapel, situated at Hough Green, erected in 1839. The Cheshire Midland Railway from Altrincham to Northwich passes through the township, and has a station here, which is the nearest point to alight for Rostherne, the village being about 2 miles distant. A court leet and baron is held here yearly about Michaelmas. Lord Egerton of Tatton is lord of the manor. The flour mill, an ancient structure, within a short distance of The Hall, worked by an overshot wheel, is situated on the river Bollin, just above which is the dam head, forming a pretty cascade. The chief crops are wheat, barley, oats, and beans; the soil is a stiff clay. The principal landed proprietors, in addition to Lord Egerton of Tatton, are Cooper Cooper, Esq., John Orrell, Esq., and R. J. Lindsay, Esq. The population in 1861 was 375, and the area 2,177a. 1r. 27p.; the rateable value is £3,931 16s. 8d., and the gross estimated rental £4,194 10s. 4d.
